Welcome

Mr. Corey Rushton, Chair, called the meeting to order at 3:03 p.m. He reviewed guidelines for the virtual meeting, requesting that Trustees keep their video on and remain muted when not speaking to ensure professional focus. Mr. Rushton noted that while the chat feature is available for clarifying questions, any substantial discussions must be conducted verbally for the official record.

**Review
agenda for

Board meeting**

Mr. Jacob Young, General Manager, reviewed the June 10, 2026, Board Meeting agenda, introducing a new "Member Agency Feature" designed to enhance stakeholder engagement. Chair Rushton explained that this feature aims to move beyond the status quo by inviting agencies to share their unique strengths and partnership opportunities with JVVCD, and that Taylorsville-Bennion Improvement District was selected for the lead-off spot. Mr. Young also highlighted key items for the Wednesday meeting, including a water quality update on backflow prevention, the final adoption of water rates and the 2026/2027 budget, and the results of a routine fraud risk assessment. He noted that we would also be discussing a couple of member agency grants, the purchase of a dump truck, and a proposed change to a Key Performance Indicator (KPI) under water resource sustainability.

Mr. John H. Taylor, Trustee, joined the web conference at 3:09 p.m.

**Fraud Risk
Assessment**

Mr. David Martin, Chief Financial Officer, presented the 2026 Fraud Risk Assessment, a tool established by the State Auditor's Office to reduce the risk of fraud through a point-based implementation system. He walked the Board through the various categories, emphasizing JVVCD's strict adherence to the separation of duties, such as ensuring that different personnel handle cash collection and general ledger entries. Mr. Martin noted that JVVCD achieved a perfect score of 395 out of 395. Trustee Dawn Ramsey expressed her appreciation for the staff's work, noting that a perfect score is a significant achievement.

Mr. David Martin and Mr. Eric Stone, Controller, provided training on the Audit Committee's roles and responsibilities, which follow best practice and state recommendations. Mr. Martin explained that the committee serves three primary functions: compliance oversight, internal control monitoring, and audit oversight. He described the various purposes of an audit committee and highlighted some of the functions. Mr. Stone added that while some committees are passive, this committee remains active in monitoring management and developing audit plans. Trustee Cindy Wood commented on the high level of confidence provided by having a former CPA firm partner on the staff.

**DISCUSSION
ITEMS**

Mr. Benjamin Stanley, General Counsel, presented a draft of the new Water Availability Form, a key component of the new Water Budget Policy recently enacted. He indicated that the form requires developers to provide project

Legal/Policy	characteristics, demand projections, and identify water sources, with options for a fee in lieu of water if a supply gap exists. Mr. Young noted that West Jordan City would pilot the initial rollout of the digital form to further refine the form before the full release. Chair Rushton suggested the form include information on whether proposed water sources require a change application, noting that municipalities need to be aware of any potential legal hurdles or objections early in the process.
Water budget policy	
Engineering & Water Development	Mr. Shane Swensen, Director of Engineering & Water Development, and Ms. Kelly Good, Director of Community Engagement, introduced a new supplemental funding strategy intended to move JVWCD from a reactive to a proactive approach in obtaining state and federal grants. The strategy involves aligning priority capital projects with the federal and state budget cycles and utilizing consultants to maximize the value to ratepayers. Shane Swensen explained that JVWCD has been successful with funding through Representative Owens and is currently awaiting feedback from Senator Curtis on several projects. Trustee Dawn Ramsey recommended that JVWCD sit with our lobbyist, Marcus Faust, at least six months ahead of the budget cycle to identify which funds are likely to be prioritized.
Supplemental funding strategy	
Community Engagement	Mr. Courtney Brown presented two member agency grant applications. Kearns Improvement District requested \$65,500 for its second year of water efficiency standards funding to improve technology and customer engagement. The City of South Salt Lake applied for a standard conservation grant of \$52,040 to support three projects: an update to their water conservation plan, landscape renovations at their community center, and city-wide irrigation upgrades. Chair Rushton inquired about the success of the Kearns outreach across multiple jurisdictions, and Mr. Brown noted that the program has been working well without any reported setbacks.
Member Agency grants	
Other Business	Mr. Young discussed logistical plans for the upcoming ACE conference in Washington, D.C., including a group baseball activity and a reception hosted by Marcus Faust. He noted that the reception would be a valuable opportunity for the Board to meet JVWCD's D.C. lobbying team. Mr. Young also reminded Trustees of the Annual Employee Retirement Plan Meeting is scheduled to begin immediately following the adjournment of the Work Session.
Adjourn	Mr. Rushton called for a motion to adjourn. Mr. John Richardson moved to adjourn. Followed by a second from Mr. Mick Sudbury. The meeting adjourned at 4:45 p.m.

Mr. Corey Rushton, Chair, convened the Board meeting of the Jordan Valley Water Conservancy District Board of Trustees at 3:02 p.m. on Wednesday, June 10, 2026. Mr. Rushton introduced the members of the Board and the public who attended the meeting both in person and electronically.

**Approval of common
consent items**

Mr. Rushton presented the minutes of the Work Session held May 11, 2026, and the Public Hearing/Board meeting held May 13, 2026. He also presented the May 2026 Trustees' Expenses Report. Mr. Rushton called for a motion. Mr. John Richardson moved to approve the minutes of the May 11 and 13 meetings and the Trustees' Expenses Report for May 2026. Following a second by Ms. Barbara Townsend, the motion was unanimously approved by those present as follows:

Public Comments

**Member Agency
Feature – Taylorsville-
Bennion Improvement
District**

Mr. Mark Chalk, General Manager, Taylorsville-Bennion Improvement District (TBID), presented TBID's history and operations. He noted that TBID serves approximately 70,000 residents with 17,500 connections. TBID maintains eleven active wells, which provides approximately 65% of its total water

	needs and allows them to keep rates low while relying on JVVCD for approximately 4,700 acre-feet/year of water. Mr. Chalk expressed appreciation for the reliability and quality of JVVCD's water supply and identified areas for continued partnership, including legislative leadership and regional resiliency planning. He specifically highlighted the importance of sustaining conservation gains and working together to avoid "conservation fatigue" among customers.
Core Mission Reports	
Water supply update	Ms. Shazelle Terry, Chief Operating Officer, reviewed the Municipal and Industrial (M&I) Water Deliveries report through May 2026, reporting that while JVVCD is seeking a 10% reduction in water use due to drought conditions, both wholesale and retail deliveries for May successfully met this target. Ms. Terry stated that upcoming reports would include target markers for each Member Agency to reflect the requested 10% reduction based on the previous year's actual usage. She then reviewed the Water Sources Update noting that JVVCD has begun dipping into reservoir storage earlier than preferred due to a poor snowpack.
Water quality update	Mr. Gordon Batt, Director of Water Quality and Operations, provided an overview of JVVCD's cross-connection control program. He explained that cross-connections are physical links between potable water and potential hazards, such as garden hoses in pools or improperly installed secondary systems that can lead to backflow events that can contaminate the water supply. Mr. Batt detailed JVVCD's use of Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) to detect reverse flows. He then highlighted the cross-connection program's five required components including having local authority to perform annual inspections, providing public awareness and education, having trained and certified staff, maintaining records of program activities, and providing ongoing enforcement.
Standing Committee Reports	
Finance update	Mr. Eric Stone, Controller, reviewed the Financial Report for March and April 2026. Focusing on April, he noted that net revenues after debt service are performing better than expected. He noted a contributing factor was an increase in investment income, which is currently 114% of the budget. Mr. Stone reviewed JVVCD's diversified investment portfolio across the PTIF (Public Treasurers Investment Fund), Raymond James, and Zions Bank. Mr. Stone then explained a timing issue with making extra payments in April to the Utah Retirement Systems due to a system update.
Conservation update	Ms. Kelly Good, Director of Community Engagement, reported on spring activities, including the Spring Garden Fair, which saw over 600 attendees despite rainy weather. She highlighted the success of the school tour program, which provides free busing for students across the service area to come to the Conservation Garden Park and learn about water conservation. Ms. Good then noted that 18 landscape incentive projects were completed in May, resulting in \$174,306 reimbursed to participants.
Financial Matters	
Consider adoption of Resolution No. 26-09,	Mr. David Martin, Chief Financial Officer, reviewed the proposed water rates for FY 2026-2027, which included an average rate adjustment of 4.7%. He reminded the Board that the proposed rates were tentatively approved at the April Board meeting and also discussed with JVVCD's Member Agencies at

the Annual Member Agency meeting in April, and at a public hearing on May 13, 2026. JVVCD’s retail customers and others were sent notice of the public hearing, where comments were made and noted. No further comments have been received since the public hearing. Mr. Martin explained that the updated retail water rates include a new high-volume surcharge for the highest tiers of single-family residential use and adjustments to tier thresholds. Mr. Martin said the FY 2026-2027 tentative budget and financial plan is based on 108,500 acre-feet of water deliveries, an average water rate increase of 4.7%, no property tax increase, using \$6.2 million from the Revenue Stabilization Fund, and projected capital projects funding. The proposed budget will fund items including the Operations and Maintenance budget, which includes a 6.3% increase over the previous fiscal year budget, bond principal and interest, with an 8.4% decrease, and a 21.6% increase in transfers and reserves funding. The total budget, sources and uses, is \$227.5 million. He then reviewed the operation and maintenance budget, general equipment budget, and capital projects budget. Mr. Martin recommended adoption of Resolution No. 26-10, “Adopting JVVCD’s Tentative Budget and Financial Plan for Fiscal Year 2026-2027.”

Mr. Shane Swensen, Director of Engineering & Water Development, presented information on a proposed construction contract for asphalt replacement at the 3200 West 6200 South 8-MG above-ground steel reservoir. He explained that the existing maintenance road surrounding the reservoir has reached the end of its useful life, suffering from severe cracking and water ponding. There is also a drain box that prevents vehicles from driving around the reservoir. The objective of the project is to re-grade the road and replace the asphalt while widening the road which will allow vehicles to safely drive completely around the facility for maintenance. He said that three bids were received for the project, and staff recommended awarding a construction contract in the amount of \$149,030 to ACME Construction, a firm that has performed well for JVWCD on previous projects.

To address aging components and ensure continued system resilience, the project includes replacing two deteriorated pumps and motors, installing a new valve, and adding two new variable frequency drives to increase operational flexibility and extend equipment life. He said four bids were received with Corrio Construction as the low bidder. Mr. Swensen recommended awarding a construction contract to Corrio Construction in the amount of \$448,696.

Mr. Swensen proposed a construction contract for the replacement of approximately 8,800 feet of aging cast iron pipe in the Millcreek area. He noted that the existing pipes, installed in the 1950's and 1960's, are reaching the end of their service life and experiencing frequent breaks. Because roughly 70% of the project area involves UDOT roadways, the contract requires specialized night work and higher-level asphalt materials and fill to meet state specifications. Eleven bids were received, with Silver Spur Construction submitting the low bid of \$3,357,900. Mr. Swensen said Silver Spur Construction has performed satisfactorily for other entities that were contacted by staff and recommended awarding a construction contract in the amount of \$3,357,900.

Discussion followed regarding the required specifications in the bid documents. During the discussion, Mr. Mick Sudbury expressed concerns regarding confidential procurement information. Mr. Rushton recommended deferring the item to the end of the meeting after a closed session discussion.

Mr. Swensen presented information on a proposed engineering contract for the Utah Lake/Jordan River Treatability Study (Study). He said JVVCD's water portfolio contains more than 15,000 acre-feet of Utah Lake/Jordan River surface water and shallow groundwater rights. The supply contains elevated levels of organics and suspended solids requiring advanced treatment to meet drinking water standards. He said it is JVVCD's plan to begin utilizing this water within ten years, so the Study is meant to characterize future water supplies from the Jordan River and to select appropriate treatment processes, such as advanced membranes. He said four excellent proposals were received with Brown and Caldwell being ranked the highest. Mr. Swensen stated a fee of \$275,500 had been negotiated with Brown and Caldwell and recommended awarding an engineering contract to Brown and Caldwell in the amount of \$275,500.

Mr. Rushton asked for clarification on the budget. Mr. Swensen said the initial budget for the Study was done over a year ago and has since been reviewed. Also, additional tasks have been added to the scope of the project to include looking at canal waters, groundwater, and wastewater treatment plant effluent as potential water sources. He said the total requested approval amount also includes \$50,000 to allow for contingencies.

Consider approval of funding commitment letter for the 2024/2025 BRIC JVVCD Jordan Aqueduct Seismic Project

Mr. Shane Swensen, requested approval of a funding commitment letter to support a FEMA Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) grant application for the 2024/2025 BRIC JVVCD Jordan Aqueduct Seismic Project. Building on a study from five years ago that identified broad hazards, this project will perform in-depth analysis on three specific segments of the aqueduct identified as highly susceptible to seismic activity, liquefaction, and landslides and aims to develop engineered solutions to protect this critical infrastructure. He said the FEMA grant application process requires matching funds of 25%, or approximately \$150,000 for JVVCD's commitment for the \$600,000 study. Mr. Swensen recommended approval of a funding commitment letter to be signed by the General Manager and authorizing the Chief Operating Officer to sign the FEMA grant application.

Asset Reliability & Management Activities

Consider approval of expenditure to purchase Dump Truck

Mr. Brian Callister, Director of Asset Management, explained that JVVCD regularly evaluates its fleet to ensure vehicles remain safe, reliable, and cost-effective. He identified the specific need to replace a 2009 International dump truck that has reached the end of its reliable service life after 17 years of use. This vehicle serves as a primary piece of equipment for critical JVVCD operations, including mainline breaks, restoration, and general construction and maintenance activities. He said the proposed replacement, a 2027 International dump truck, is expected to improve operational efficiency and reduce downtime and maintenance costs. Mr. Callister highlighted several safety and functionality upgrades over the current model, including a more suitable configuration, a backup camera, enhanced lighting, and an upgraded lift axle to assist with heavy loads. To ensure JVVCD received competitive pricing, the invitation for bid was advertised on JVVCD's website and sent to several known vendors, resulting in five responsive bids. Mr. Callister recommended awarding the expenditure to purchase to Rush Truck Centers of Utah, the lowest responsive bidder, for a total of \$187,311.

He also reviewed other routine reporting items which included facilities rental agreements signed by the General Manager, and media coverage that included recent legislative reports regarding drought response and infrastructure improvement needs.

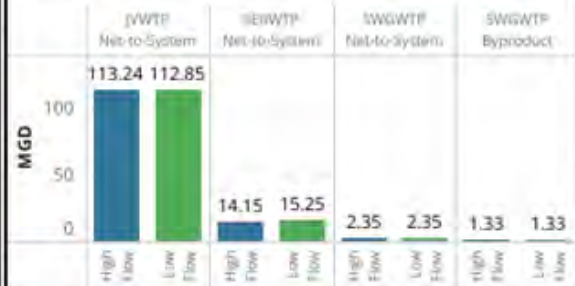


Average Daily Demand - 30 Day Lag/15 Day Lead

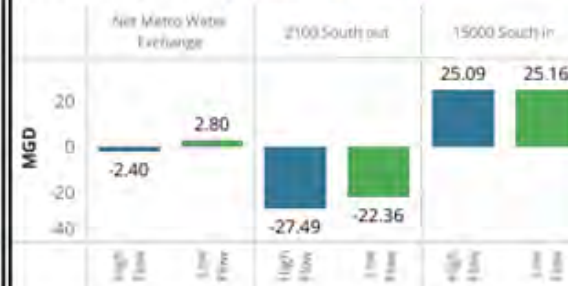

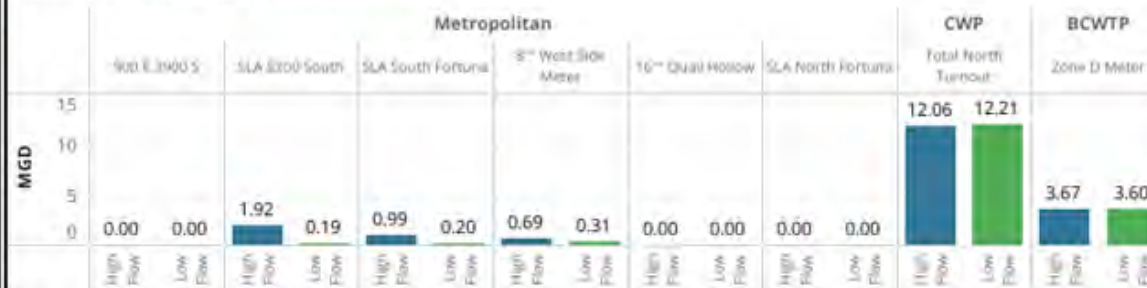


Peak Daily Demand - 30 Day Lag/15 Day Lead

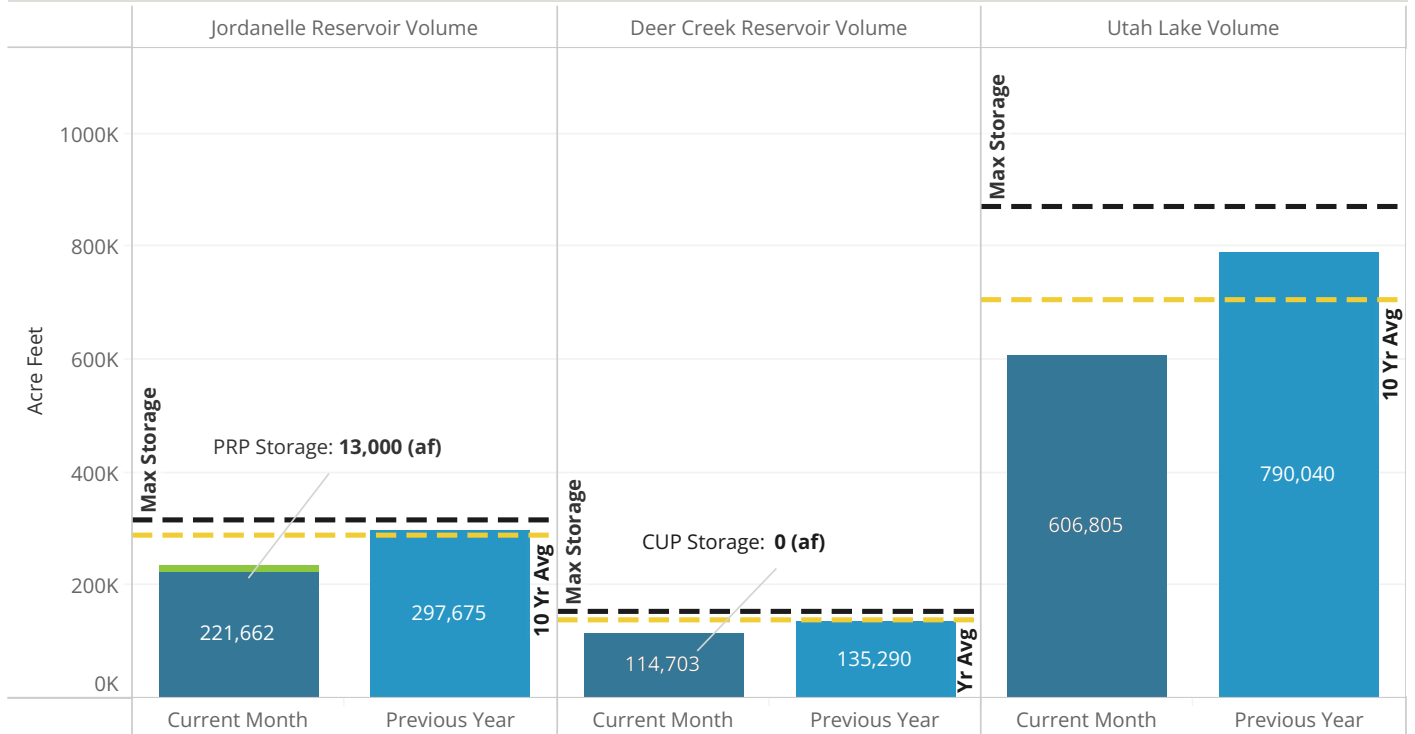

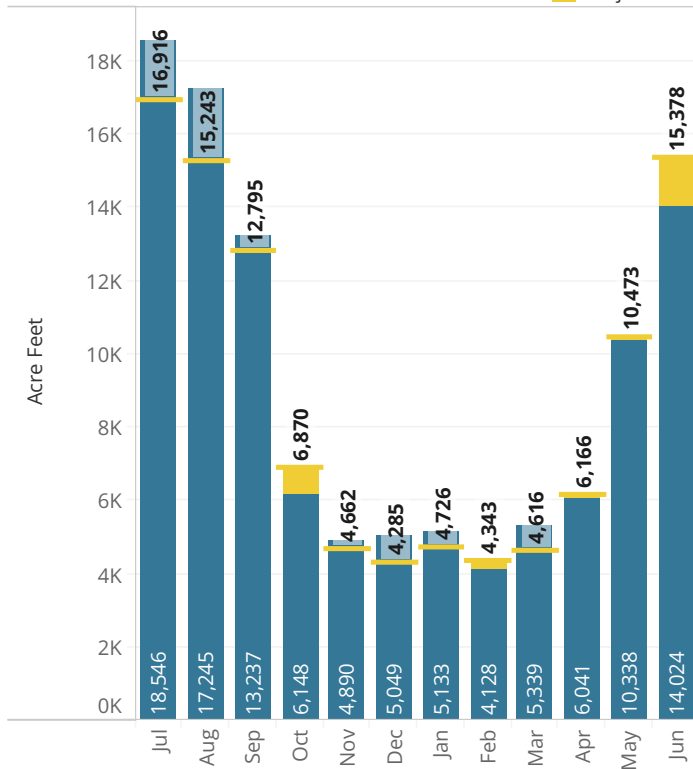

M&I Water Sources Water Year 2026 (November 1, 2025 - October 31, 2026)

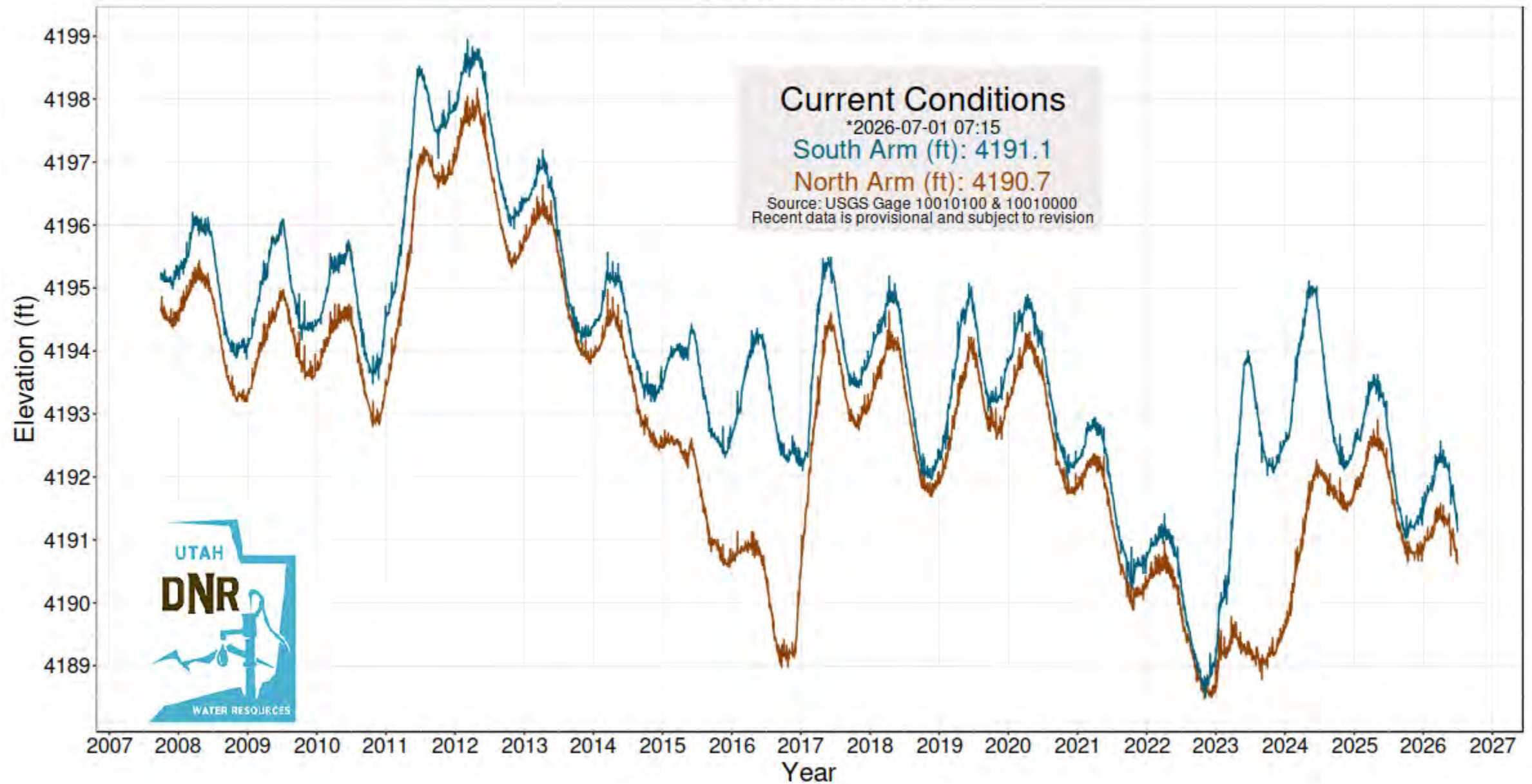


Irrigation Water Sources Irrigation Season 2026 (April 15, 2026 - October 15, 2026)

Consumer Confidence Reports (aka WQ Reports)



- The first required report was published in 1999 containing data from the 1998 calendar year.
- The CCR must include all detected results for samples collected in the calendar year, regulated or not, from all finished water sources. For us that includes water purchased from CUWCD and treated for Jordan Valley by MWDSLS.
- Data must be compiled to show a max, min, and average concentration for each detected parameter. If not sampled in the report year, the look back period is 5 years.
- Must include a description of the water system including water sources, detected results and applicable definitions, information on *Cryptosporidium* and radon, explanations of any violations, and required language regarding public health expectations for drinking water.



Consumer Confidence Reports Distribution And Notification

Data is due to member agencies by April 1 of the following year, and finished reports must be made available to retail customers by July 1.

- A notice has been included on each customer's bill with a link directly to the online report and a bill stuffer with the website and highlights will be included with the July bills.
- A flier is delivered to the office or common lobby of apartment and rental units within our system.
- Copies of the flier are also delivered to community facilities such as recreation centers, libraries, and community centers where customers may visit.
- The full 2025 Consumer Confidence Report has been posted on Jordan Valley Water's Website.
- In 2027 new requirements will require reports be published every 6 months with required information regarding lead in drinking water and greater access to translations in other languages, along with other minor changes intended to make reports easier to understand.

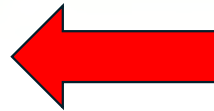

Beyond meeting required standards, our advanced treatment systems are operated to achieve internal water quality goals that are often more rigorous than federal and state requirements.

Protecting drinking water begins long before treatment. Through state-approved source protection programs, JVWCD works with local partners to help protect groundwater and surface water sources from potential contamination.

Water Quality Testing

The testing results on the following pages include all parameters required by state and federal agencies for 2025. Additionally we test for parameters above and beyond those required to ensure the water we provide is of the highest quality. These results are also included.

Notes

Annual monitoring isn't required for parameters with 'Last Sampled' years marked with an '' since concentration levels are typically slow to change.*

Secondary Standards (SS or NSDWR) are non-enforceable guidelines regulating contaminants that may cause cosmetic effects (such as skin or tooth discoloration) or aesthetic effects (such as taste, odor, or color) in drinking water. EPA recommends secondary standards to water systems but does not require systems to comply with the standard.

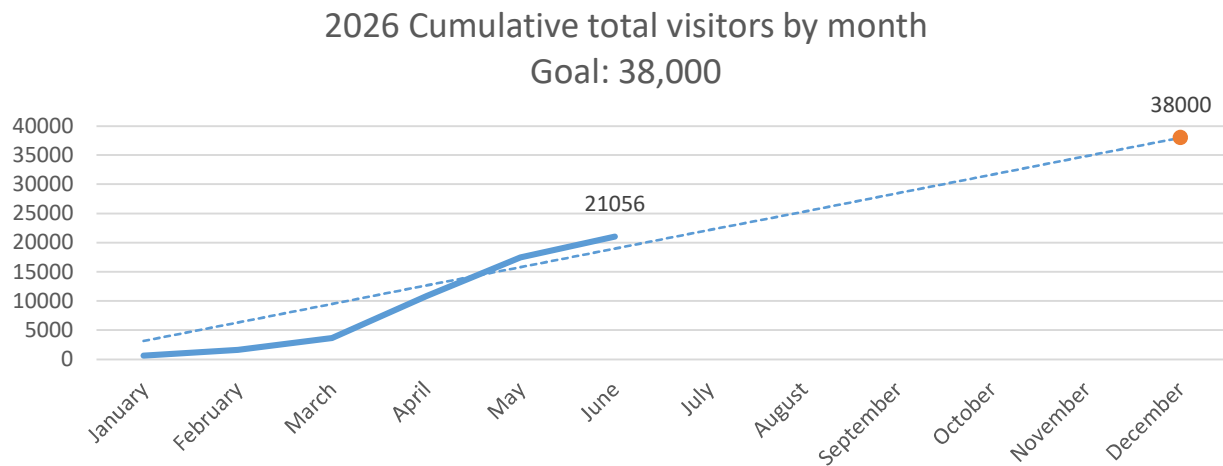

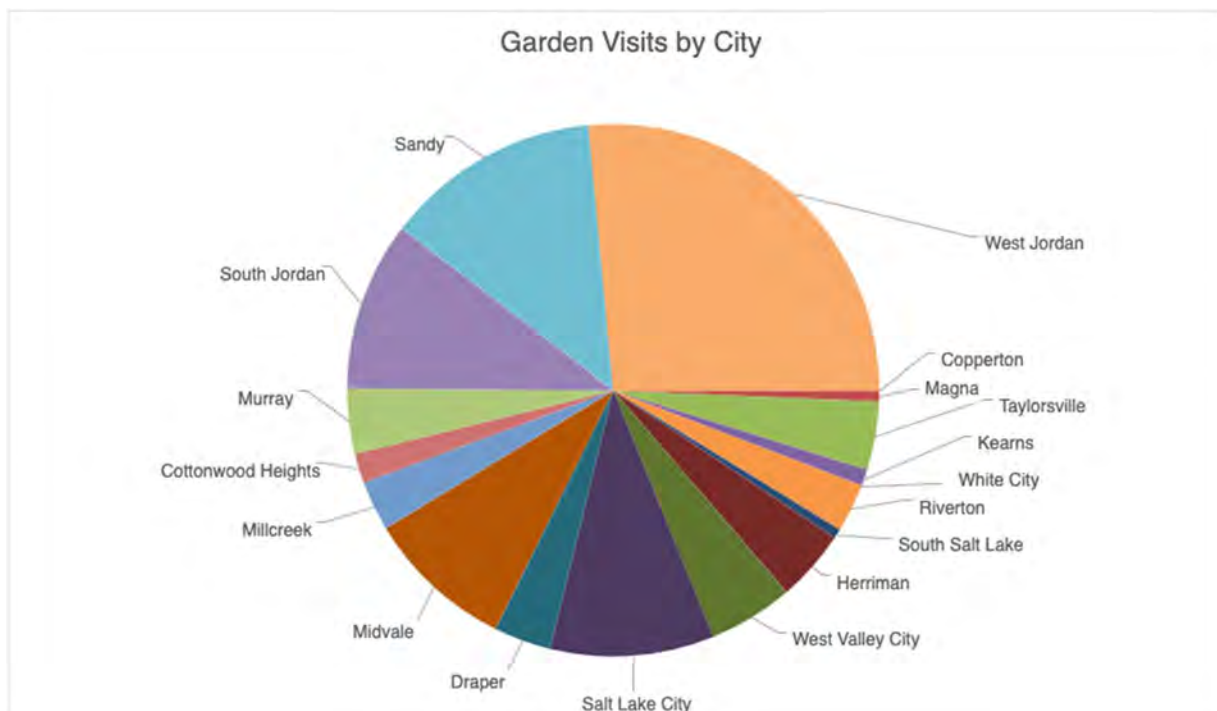

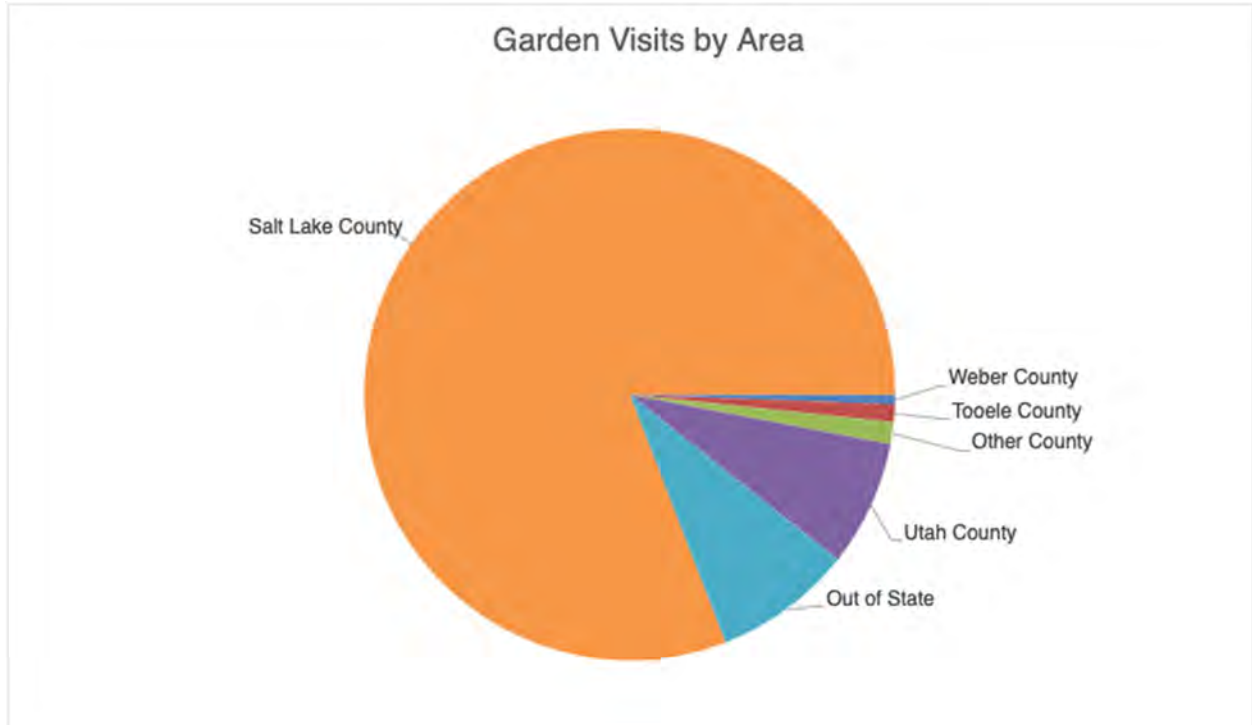
Visitation Total (updated 7/1/2026)

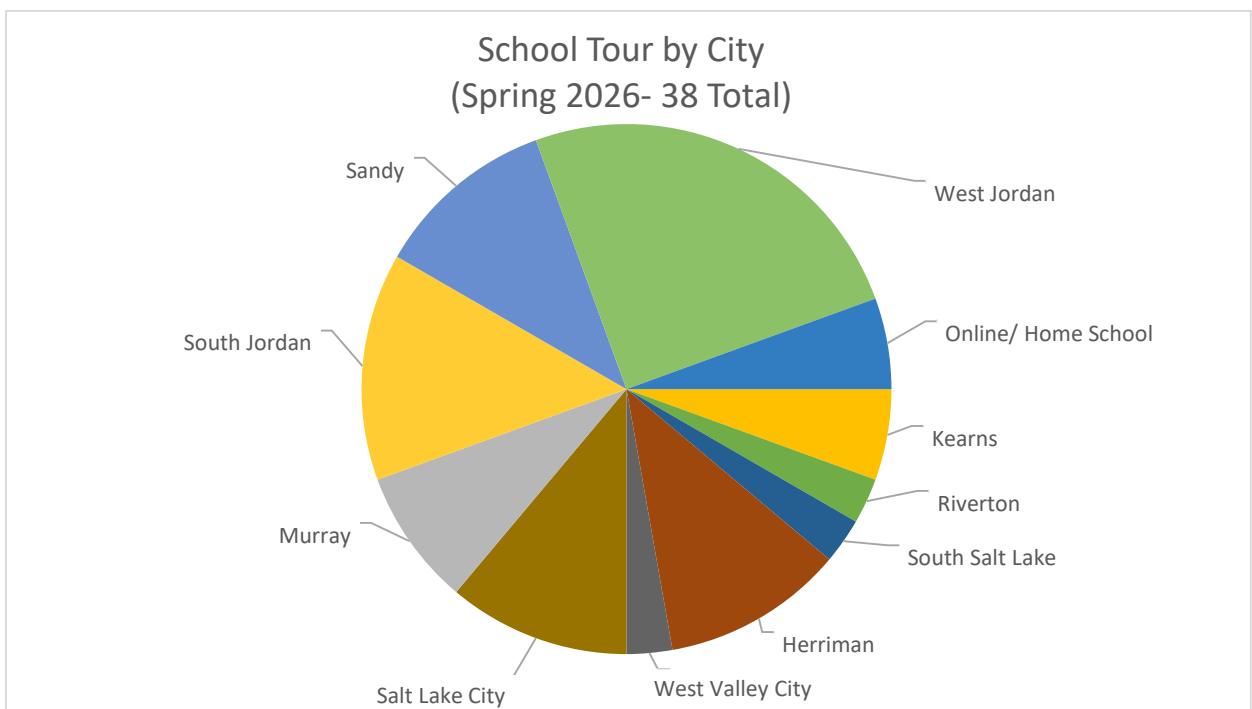

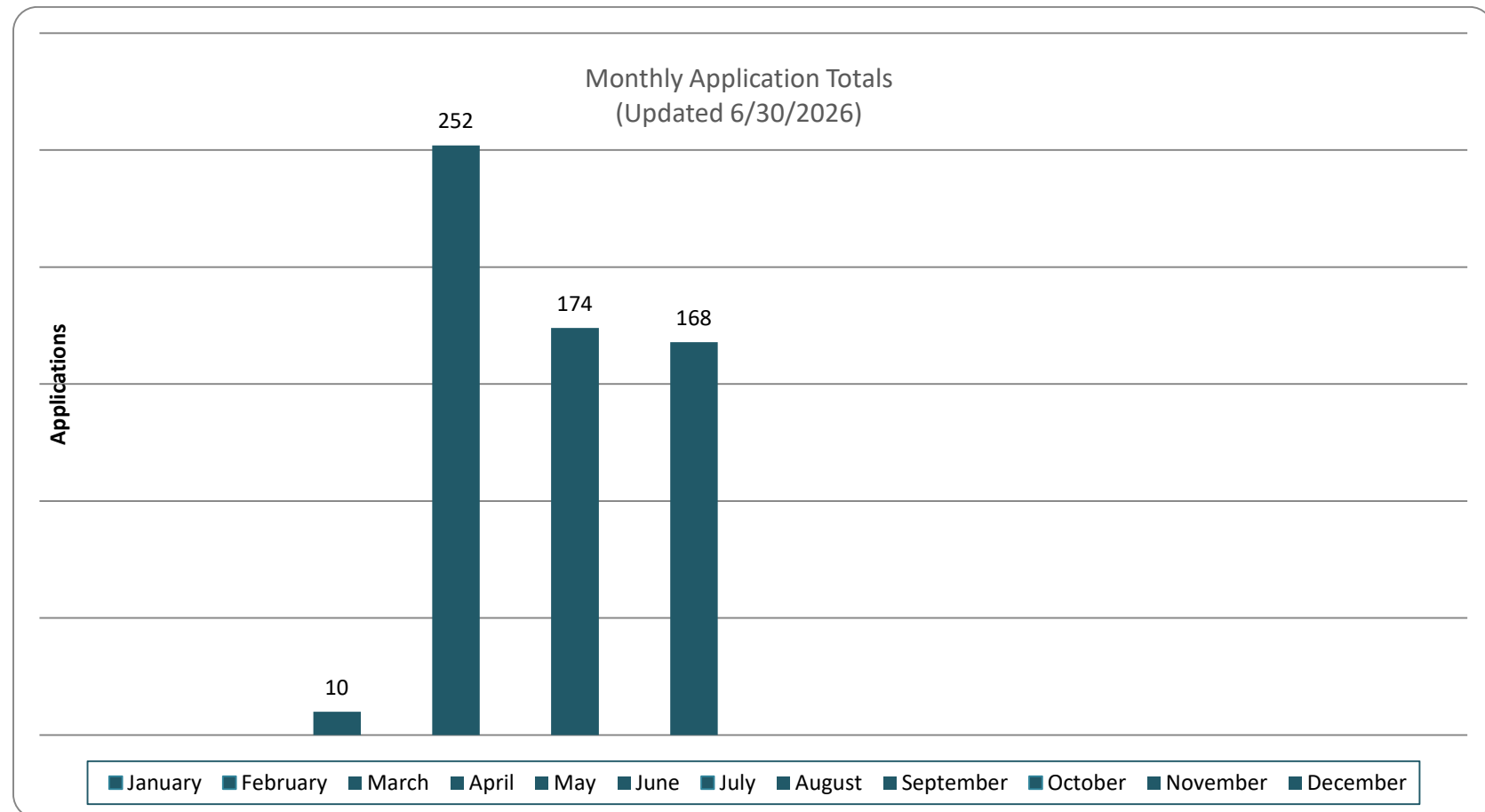

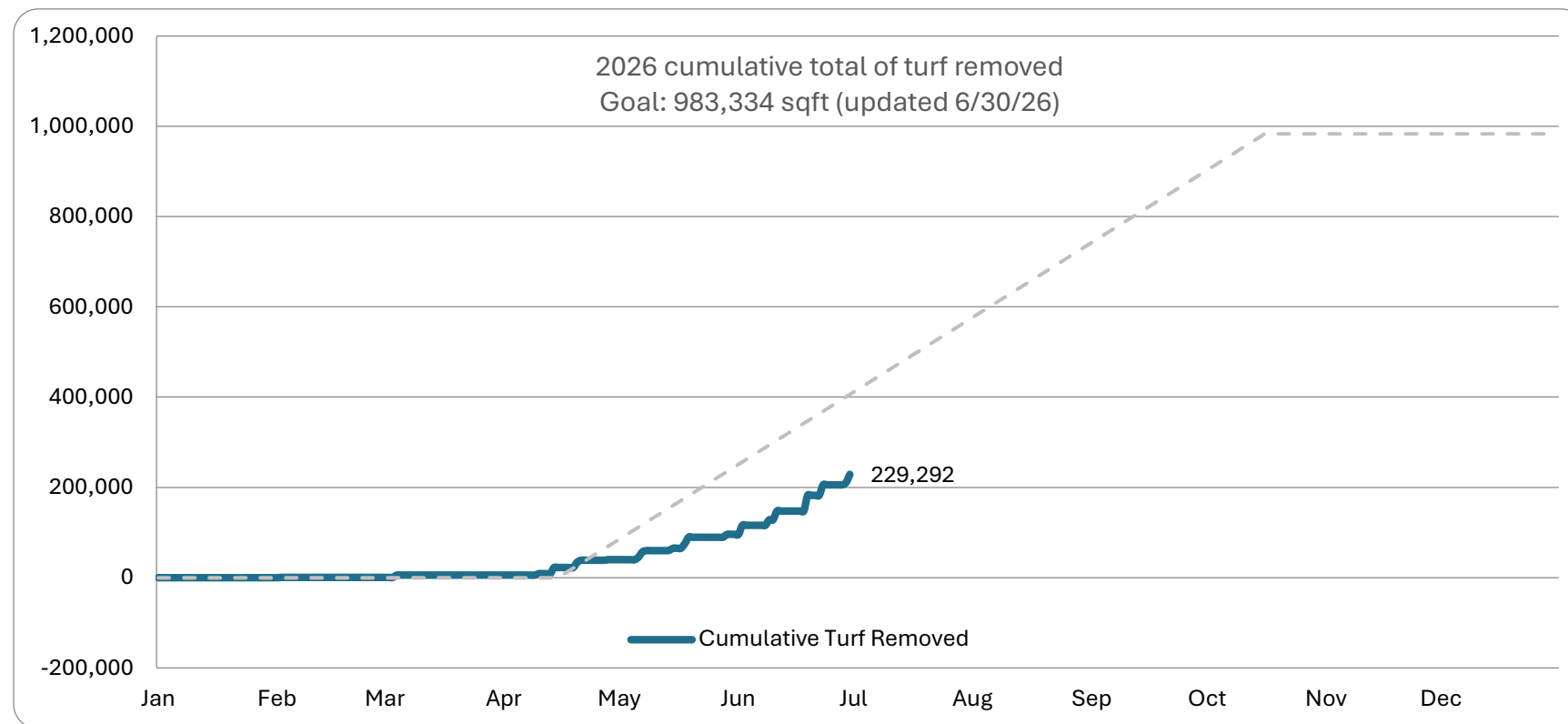

Summary:

The City of West Jordan is seeking grant funding assistance from JVWCD for the following purposes:

Leak Detection and Prevention Sensors

West Jordan will be purchasing remote sensor devices for hydrants that identify pressure fluctuations and other potential problems in the water system. These will allow for rapid response mitigation before a main line break and ultimately a reduction in water loss.

Park Secondary Pump Renovation Project

The Park Secondary Pump Renovation Project will restore and modernize secondary irrigation systems at Browns Meadow Park, Plum Creek Park, and Jordan Meadows Park. These parks were historically irrigated using secondary water; however, due to prolonged disrepair of the pump stations, they have relied on culinary water in recent years. Park Operations staff have initiated efforts to rehabilitate and upgrade the existing pump infrastructure to return these sites to secondary water use. This project will include repairing or replacing outdated pumps, improving system efficiency, and ensuring reliable operation to support sustainable landscape irrigation. By upgrading to a smart irrigation controller, water managers will be able to save water by tracking water use in these parks. Other water efficiency features include flow sensors to shut off water in the event of a system break, rain sensors, and automated alerts.

Irrigation Efficiency Program

This program will identify high-water-use landscape properties owned by the City of West Jordan for on-site irrigation audits, immediate system repairs, or optimization services to generate quantifiable water savings.

Community Outreach Materials

This funding supports the expansion of community outreach efforts in West Jordan to better educate residents on effective indoor and outdoor water conservation practices. Outreach materials include bill stuffers, booth displays, and water-saving device giveaways.

Recommendation:

Approve the award of \$87,000 to the City of West Jordan for water conservation funding.

MEMBER AGENCY WATER CONSERVATION FUNDING AGREEMENT

This Agreement is made and entered into as of July 1, 2026 (the “Effective Date”), by and between the Jordan Valley Water Conservancy District, a Utah special district (“District”), and the City of West Jordan, a Utah municipality (“Member Agency”).

RECITALS:

- A. The District desires to provide funding assistance to the Member Agency for a water conservation project within the Member Agency’s retail service area relating to leak detection equipment, secondary pump renovations, irrigation system improvements, and community outreach materials (the “Project”);
- B. The Member Agency wishes to obtain funding assistance from the District and represents that it has met the eligibility requirements; and,
- C. The Member Agency has submitted to the District a proposal outlining the Project and requesting funding assistance, and the District is willing to provide funding assistance, consistent with the terms of this Agreement.

TERMS:

The parties agree as follows:

- 1. Project Description. A description of the Project to be completed by the Member Agency is set forth in attached Exhibit A.
- 2. Project Schedule. The Project shall be completed by the Member Agency in accordance with the schedule set forth in attached Exhibit A, notwithstanding any other provision or Exhibit of this Agreement to the contrary.

3. Project Administration and Correspondence.

4. Eligibility for Project Funding. The Member Agency represents it has:

(a) Adopted, by formal resolution, a water conservation goal of reducing per capita water use in its service area by at least twenty-five percent (25%) by year 2025, using year 2000 as a baseline year for comparison purposes; and,

(b) Complied with the Utah Water Conservation Plan Act, Utah Code Ann. § 73-10-32, and has filed a water conservation plan with the State of Utah, Division of Water Resources.

5. Member Agency Responsibilities and Ownership.

(a) The Member Agency and/or its representatives shall provide all labor, services, supplies, and materials to implement and complete the Project, including but not limited to administration, promotion, marketing, management, data collection, analysis, and reporting.

(b) All materials and supplies necessary to implement and complete the Project shall be the exclusive property of the Member Agency. The District shall have no

ownership, right, title, security interest, or other interest in any Project facilities, materials, or supplies, nor in any rights, duties, or responsibilities for operation or maintenance thereof.

(c) The Member Agency shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local requirements to implement and complete the Project.

(d) The Member Agency shall be solely responsible for the performance of its staff and/or representatives in complying with the terms of this Agreement, and for the proper allocation of funds received from the District for implementing and completing the Project.

(e) The Member Agency shall timely prepare and submit invoices and reports to the District as further described herein.

(f) The Member Agency shall timely pay its share of the costs of the Project.

6. Cost Estimate and Funding.

(a) The funds to be provided by the District to the Member Agency shall not exceed eighty-seven thousand and 00/100 dollars (\$87,000.00).

(b) The costs for the Project to be paid by the District and by the Member Agency are set forth in attached Exhibit A. All costs greater than those shown in Exhibit A, which are necessary to implement and complete the Project pursuant to this Agreement, if any, shall be paid by the Member Agency. The Member Agency shall pay no less than twenty percent (20%) of the total cost of the Project.

7. Invoicing Requirements.

(a) The Member Agency shall invoice the District on a quarterly basis pursuant to the following schedule:

(b) Invoices shall be sufficiently detailed to allow for review and approval by the District and each shall include the following: a cover letter indicating the billing period; a detailed breakdown of the costs submitted for reimbursement, including man hours and billing rates; documentation supporting the invoice, such as invoices for supplies, consulting services, etc.; and, an accounting of the amount(s) previously invoiced with respect to the total funding amount provided under this Agreement. The final invoice for the Project, or a component of the Project, shall provide information and documentation sufficient to demonstrate that it has been completed in accordance with the requirements and conditions of this Agreement.

8. Periodic Meetings. The District, at its discretion, may request periodically a meeting for review of the Member Agency's progress toward implementation and completion of the Project, including an initial meeting prior to commencement of the Project.

9. Reporting Requirements.

(a) Beginning with 2026, and for five (5) consecutive years following completion of the Project, the Member Agency shall provide to the District an annual calculation of per capita water uses within its retail service area. The calculation shall include an estimate of the population served and the volume of water delivered. This information shall be provided to the District by February 15 following the specific calendar year for which the report is made.

(b) If records are available, the Member Agency shall provide to the District, on or before July 1, 2027, the information requested in subparagraph 9 (a) for each calendar year between 2000 and 2026.

(c) Within forty-five (45) days following termination of this Agreement and prior to final payment, the Member Agency shall submit to the District a final, written report, including a summary of the Project; problems/challenges encountered; customer responses; Project benefits; a breakdown of final Project costs; and an evaluation regarding the effectiveness of the Project.

(d) If a retail customer of the Member Agency receives and installs a water-conserving device, fixture, or equipment as part of the Project, the Member Agency shall provide to the District the customer's water use information for three (3) full years prior to and following installation of the device, fixture, or equipment.

(e) The provisions of this paragraph 9 shall survive expiration or termination of the term of the Agreement.

10. Term. The term of this Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date, and it shall expire without further notice or condition on June 30, 2027, except all reporting obligations required by this Agreement shall survive its expiration or earlier termination for five (5) consecutive years.

11. Termination. Either party may terminate this Agreement upon sixty (60) days written notice to the other party.

12. Indemnification. The Member Agency shall indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the District, its Trustees, officers, employees, and agents against any claim or asserted liability arising out of the Member Agency's actions, either willful or negligent, or

the actions of the Member Agency's officers, employees, or agents, in providing labor, services, supplies, and materials pursuant to this Agreement, including any losses related to any claim made, whether or not court action is filed, and will include attorney fees and administrative and overhead costs related to, or arising out of, such claim or asserted liability.

13. Notices. All notices, requests, demands, and other communications required or allowed by this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be given by personal delivery or by certified mail, with return receipt requested, to the following addresses or to such other addresses as the parties may designate in writing:

Notice shall be effective on the date it is received by the other party.

14. Amendment. This Agreement may be amended only by written instrument signed by both parties.

15. Binding Nature. All of the grants, covenants, terms, provisions, and conditions in this Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the successors and permitted assigns of the parties.

16. Assignment. The Member Agency shall not assign this Agreement or any of its rights under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the District. The District may assign this Agreement and/or any of its rights under this Agreement.

17. Whole Agreement. This Agreement, including exhibits, constitutes the entire agreement of the parties and supersedes all prior understandings, representations, or agreements of the parties regarding the subject matter in this document.

18. Authorization. The Member Agency represents and warrants that it has authority to enter into this Agreement. In addition, each individual executing this Agreement does hereby represent and warrant that he or she has been duly authorized to sign this Agreement in the capacity and for the entities shown.

19. Miscellaneous. The parties shall perform those acts and/or sign all documents required by this Agreement, and which may be reasonably necessary to effectuate the terms of this Agreement.

JWWCD will work with its partner, the Metropolitan Water District of Salt Lake and Sandy, to be reimbursed a portion of the local match amount in accordance with the Jordan Valley Water Operation and Maintenance Agreement.

Pending award of a FEMA BRIC grant, the JWWCD match funds will be combined with the FEMA grant funds to complete the construction project.

Summary: JVVCD desires to retain two firms to provide bond underwriter services. In a negotiated bond sale, the underwriter's primary role is to market the issuer's bonds to investors. The underwriter also works with the issuer and its municipal advisor, providing ideas and recommendations regarding the structure, timing, and marketing of bond issues. The selected underwriters will remain under contract for five years, with their participation and roles determined by JVVCD for each transaction. Bond issues exceeding \$50 million are expected to use both a senior and co-manager, while issues up to \$50 million will use only the senior manager. For transactions using both underwriters, JVVCD will determine the fee split between the senior manager and co-manager on a transaction-by-transaction basis.

To overcome this issue, operators start dosing chlorine earlier than desired which causes disinfection byproducts (DBPs) and provide a higher chlorine dose which increases customer complaints. This project aims to resolve this issue by evaluating options to increase the detention time for water leaving the treatment process. This will improve CT, lower the chlorine dose, and decrease DBPs.

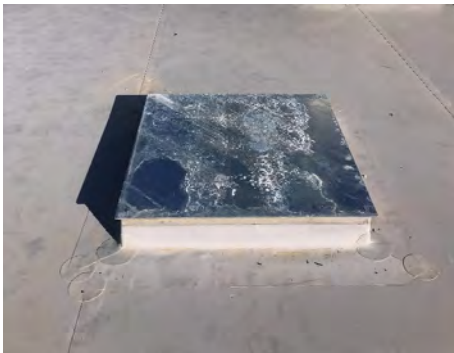

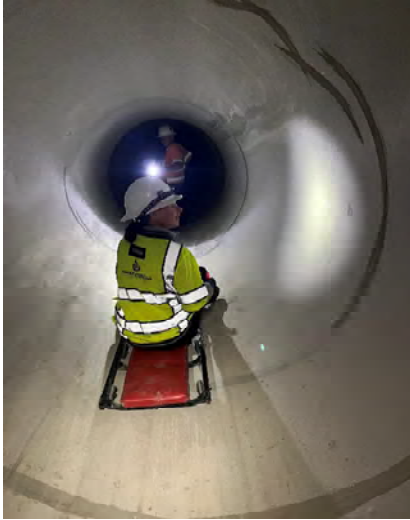

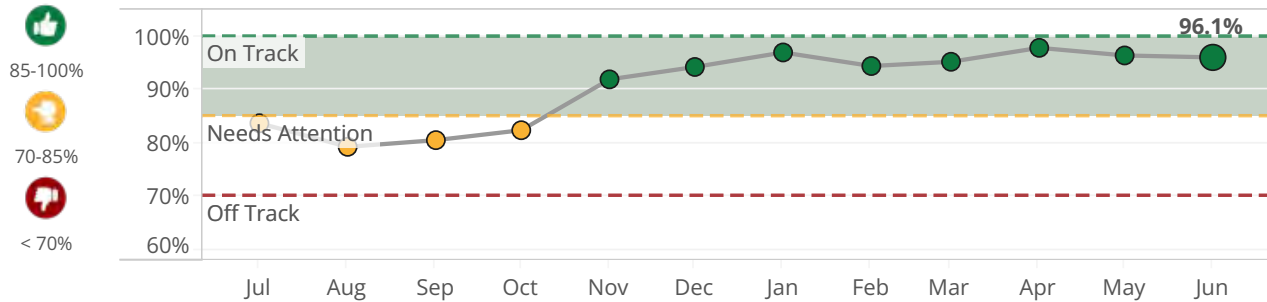

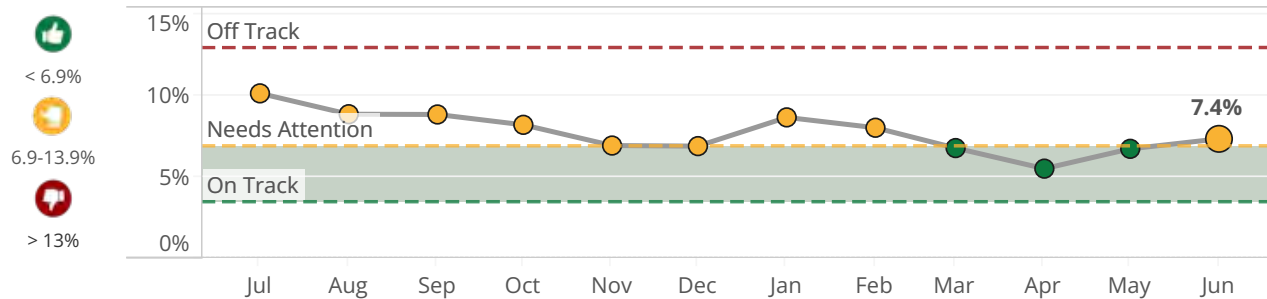

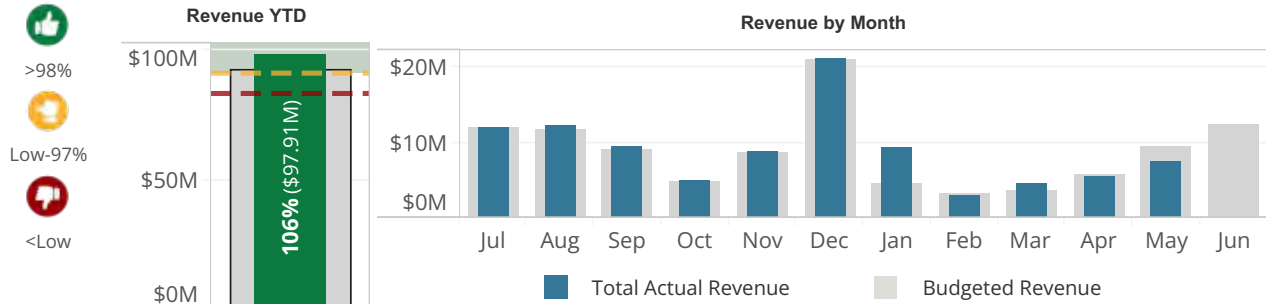

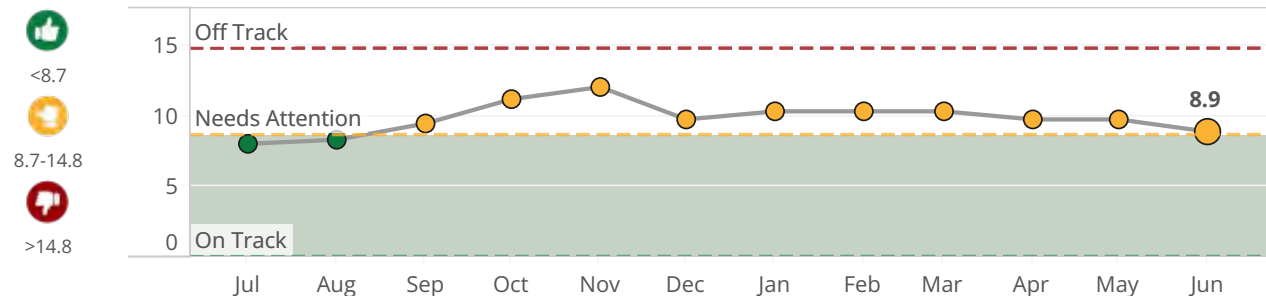

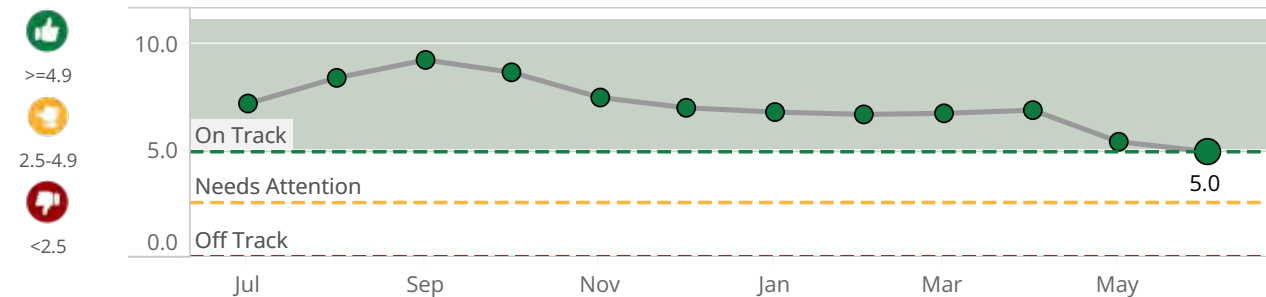

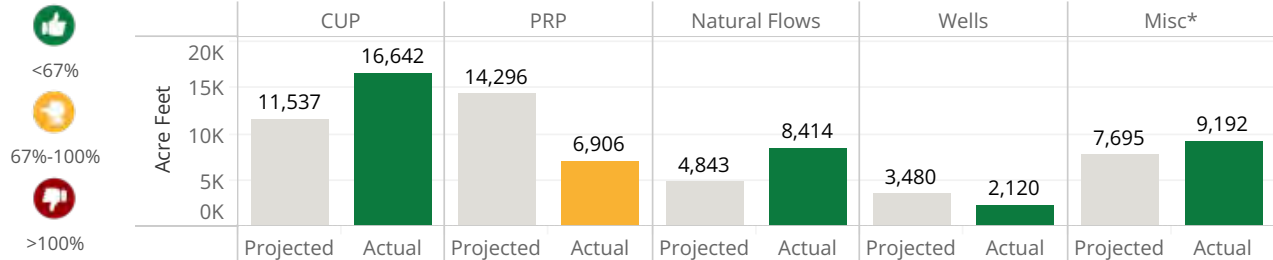

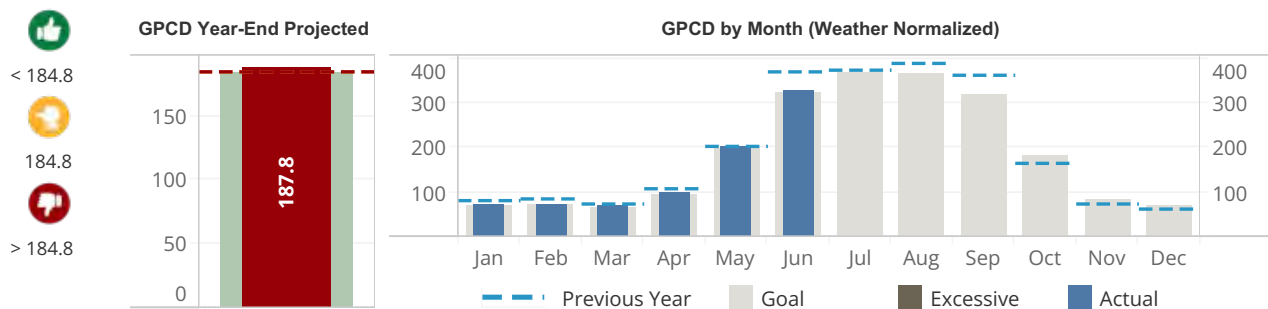

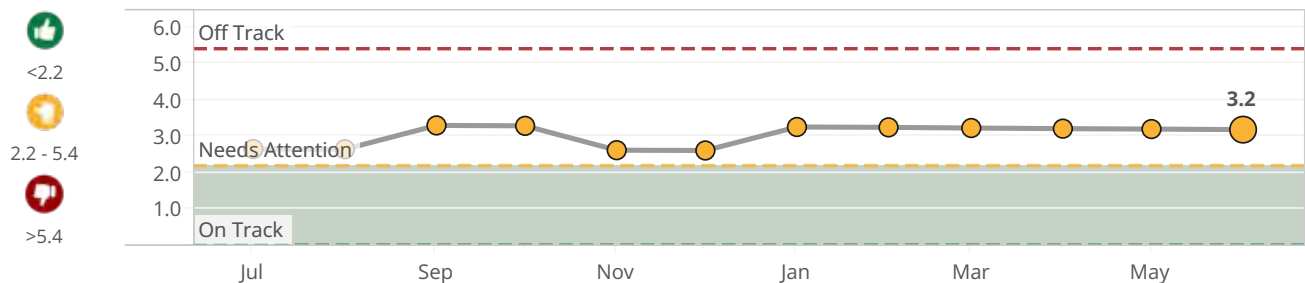

REPORT ON WATER DISTRICT WATER DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL CONTRACTS

July 8, 2026

During the 2024 Utah Legislative session the Utah Legislature passed SB211 Generational Water Infrastructure Amendments, and this new law became effective May 1, 2024. The law directs the formation of the Water District Water Development Council (Council) which is responsible for investigating a wide variety of policies and potential water infrastructure projects to support the water needs of future generations of Utah citizens. The Council consists of five members: the general managers from the four P60 water conservancy districts (WCD) and the director of Utah Division of Water Resources (DWRe). JVVCD holds a strategic position as the managing district for the Council and procures services needed by the Council on its behalf. Where the WCD staff are fully utilized, the Council employs a technical director and utilizes the services of consulting firms for engineering analyses and communication services. Each have performed well in their roles and as a result the following contracts will be extended. JVVCD is the contracting agency and the four P60 WCDs each share equally in the cost for each contract.

Technical Director Contract (JVVCD's estimated cost: \$24,000)

In 2024, JVVCD entered into a one-year contract with Mike Collins to serve as technical director for the Council. As Technical Director, Mr. Collins leads the investigation directed by the Council. The Technical Director's current contract, which expires this month, will be amended to include another year of services. The total contract amount was within General Manager's approval authority.

Communication Services Contract (JVVCD's estimated cost: \$90,000)

The scope of the communications services includes compiling and organizing information obtained through research activities, preparing written briefings for legislature and Governor, providing liaison work with House, Senate, and Executive agencies, monitoring and coordinating State appropriations, and advising the Council Chair. The FCH Group was selected through a competitive procurement process for these services in 2025. The term of the contract is up to five years, subject to automatic annual renewal by JVVCD. The contract will renew on July 14, 2026, which will start the second year of five.

Engineering Services Contract (Estimated JVVCD cost: \$22,725)

In 2024, Bowen, Collins & Associates, Inc. (BCA) was contracted to provide engineering support services for investigations directed by the Council. These services include research emerging technologies, research worldwide generational water supply projects, reconnaissance level evaluations of water supply infrastructure alternatives, and reporting on findings. Another infrastructure alternative has been identified by the Council for investigation, so an additional task order has been issued to BCA. The total contract amount was within General Manager's approval authority.

The Central Utah Water Conservancy District (CUWCD) Board of Trustees held its monthly meeting on June 17, 2026

General Managers Report

- Gene Shawcroft gave an update regarding Colorado River negotiations and activities.
 - A hearing of the US Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, chaired by Senator Lee was held last month during which members made it clear that any of the Seven Colorado River Basin States who pursue litigation should not expect to receive any money from Congress. How this might be implemented remains unclear.
 - During the last month, the Upper Division States were asked by the Department of Interior (DOI) for the following:
 - Additional information on previously submitted comments on the Bureau of Reclamation's (BOR) preliminary preferred alternative plan.
 - Comments on the Lower Basin Plan.
 - Re-share the Upper Basin Plan
 - Respond to BOR's comments on the Lower Basin Plan
 - DOI is planning for the draft FEIS to be out by the middle of July and a signed record of decision out by the end of July.
- Aubrey Bittencourt, a northern California agricultural producer, has been nominated to be the next Commissioner of Reclamation. She is awaiting Senate confirmation.
- CUWCD sponsored A Growing Water Smart Workshop in partnership with the Division of Water Resources and Utah State University. They met with several customer agencies of CUWCD over three days to discuss challenges and opportunities related to population growth and water conservation.

Technical & Professional Services Committee

- The Board approved a professional services agreement with Jacobs Engineering and Bowen & Collins Engineering for the Nebo Regional Water Project for an amount of \$81.7 Million. The project will be completed in five phases with a planned completion date in 2032. The project includes enclosing the High Line Canal, constructing three new large transmission pipelines, a new water treatment plant in Salem, a new diversion off the Spanish Fork River, de-sedimentation facilities, a pump station to an equalization pond near the treatment plant, mitigation of several drainages to the canal, pipeline crossings of Wasatch Fault, and a new trail system in partnership with Utah County.

Blake Moore, Karianne Lisonbee respond to massive data center project

Congressman Blake Moore, who represents Box Elder County, broke his silence on the proposed data center in a statement to the Deseret News on May 7.

His Republican primary opponent also spoke out amid public backlash over approval of the data center after concerns were raised about water consumption in a state in the midst of a drought.

In a statement to the Deseret News, Moore decried reports of recent threats targeting Box Elder County commissioners who approved the data center project earlier this week. Moore defended the local officials by saying they are “engaged in the process” to ensure the proposed center would benefit local residents.

“The acrimony, threats, and vitriol that have become commonplace against elected officials must stop. It’s nonsense that this is becoming our political discourse here in Utah,” Moore said. “(Officials) are trying to ensure that Box Elder County residents can experience the benefits of this development for future generations.”

Moore did not outright endorse the data center, but appeared to support the county engaging in a project that developers say would help boost national security efforts. The Utah Republican also expressed hope that the project could be carried out while also protecting natural resources in the state.

“From transcontinental travel to launching society into space, and mastering our nation’s military superiority, Box Elder has demonstrated its ability to be a part of the solution,” Moore said. “Balancing stakeholder rights and responsibilities makes government very difficult. I am hopeful that with local collaboration this project will be able to balance responsible stewardship of natural resources and water, while continuing Northern Utah’s long legacy of being a critical component of our nation’s security.”

Lisonbee, Moore’s primary challenger, also responds to data center

State Rep. Karianne Lisonbee, who is vying to unseat Moore in the Republican primary, cited concerns with the process in which the project

was approved, telling the Deseret News that voters in the district deserve more transparency.

“It took almost all of us by surprise, including the county commissioners,” Lisonbee told the Deseret News in a statement. “A public vote was held with many residents in attendance, yet no public comment was allowed. You cannot have public governance without the public’s voice.”

While not supporting nor opposing the project, Lisonbee noted there are still unanswered questions about the impact of the data center — saying other states that approved similar projects in the past “are only now realizing their data center tax incentives carry a high price tag.”

“We still have unanswered questions about the massive impact these data centers have on our water and natural gas prices,” Lisonbee said. “We must rethink how we give away tax dollars in Utah. The Legislature should address the issues I’ve highlighted.”

Lisonbee offered to host two public hearings with the Box Elder County Commission and the Military Installation Development Authority, the state authority backing the installation. Lisonbee said the group has been given outside

authority in the state.

Responses come after public backlash

It’s the first time either Moore or Lisonbee has publicly commented on the Box Elder data center since it’s been proposed.

Their responses come after public backlash has grown over the data center as opponents worry the facility would threaten water resources in the area, particularly with the shrinking Great Salt Lake. Protesters sought to interrupt the commissioners’ meeting earlier this week, but the officials ultimately approved the project.

Plans for the data center first came to light last month, sparking public debate over the environmental impacts it would have on the Great Salt Lake and the surrounding region. The center would take up about 40,000 acres across three plots of undeveloped land in the county.

The centers would then be powered by 9 gigawatts of power-generating capacity, likely from natural gas-fired plants — another element that has sparked concern about the proposal.

But developers say the center would boost the

U.S. military’s access to artificial intelligence and cloud-computing capabilities, therefore helping to counter attacks by adversarial nations.

The plan was put forward by Kevin O’Leary, a celebrity businessman, and O’Leary Digital.

“I’m the only developer of data centers on earth that graduated from environmental studies,” O’Leary said in a statement defending the project. “I’m pretty aware of what these concerns are. They are around air, water use, heat, noise pollution. So sustainability is at the heart of what we do in terms of all these proposals. We search for the best technology.”

Developers of the data center will be subject to new water reporting requirements enacted by the Utah Legislature this month — a law that was passed before the data center plan was approved but proposed by state lawmakers to address concerns around the Great Salt Lake water levels.

Great Salt Lake water levels have dramatically dropped over the last decade or so, placing it on the verge of collapse, according to warnings from local scientists and researchers. If the lake were to dry up, it would expose the Wasatch Front to toxic dust and pollutants.

County attorney halts data center referendum vote

Box Elder County residents won't be able to vote to reconsider an agreement opening the doors to a massive data center in the area.

Box Elder County Attorney Stephen R. Hadfield rejected three referendum applications filed in early May challenging county commissioners' votes approving two resolutions, including adopting an interlocal agreement with developers of the Stratos Project, a data center campus proposed for 40,000 acres of unincorporated land in northern Utah.

Hadfield determined that none of the resolutions the commissioners approved could be legally referable to voters since they were considered as administrative actions, and not newly created laws.

"Because I am obligated to interpret and uphold the law, I am legally bound to reject the applications for referendum of these resolutions. I fully anticipate and appreciate that this will allow referendum sponsors who disagree with my opinion to appeal to the state courts for further guidance and resolution," Hadfield said in a statement.

The data center project, promoted by celebrity investor Kevin O'Leary and developed with the Military Installation Development Authority (MIDA), has rocked the boat across Utah because of its magnitude, quick approval process and its potential environmental repercussions.

Under Utah law, the county said in a news release, only challenges to legislation are able to go to the ballot for a vote. "Legislative acts create new laws of general applicability based on weighing broad policy considerations, whereas administrative acts simply implement laws that already exist."

The resolution consenting to a MIDA project area implements provisions of the MIDA

Gov. Cox signs order establishing higher standards for data center development

FARMINGTON — On Friday, Gov. Cox signed Executive Order 2026-03, establishing a state-wide framework to guide the evaluation and development of large data center projects in Utah.

The executive order creates a Data Center Framework that directs state agencies to prioritize protection of water resources, including the Great Salt Lake, safeguard utility ratepayers, protect air quality, mitigate wildlife impacts, support transparent public engagement and ensure future development aligns with Utah's long-term interests.

"Utahns have raised important questions about the impact large data centers could have on water, air quality, utility rates and quality of life," said Gov. Cox. "Those concerns deserve to be taken seriously. This executive order establishes a higher bar for how these projects are evaluated and ensures that economic strength and environmental stewardship go hand in hand."

Among the framework's guiding principles are:

- Protecting the Great Salt Lake and other water resources by ensuring water consumption is not increased and water quality is protected.
- Protecting utility ratepay-

ers from bearing the costs of infrastructure needed to serve large data center developments.

- Protecting air quality and minimizing impacts on surrounding communities.
- Providing transparent, meaningful and thorough opportunities for public comment.
- Supporting responsible economic development and job creation, particularly in rural Utah.

The executive order directs state agencies to coordinate closely with one another, local governments and policymakers to ensure consistent implementation of the framework and continued public engagement as data center proposals move through review processes.

Gov. Cox convened the "Make the Lake Great Again" Roundtable at the George S. and Dolores Doré Eccles Wildlife Education Center, bringing together state leaders, federal agencies, researchers, conservation groups, business leaders and philanthropists to discuss the future of the Great Salt Lake and opportunities for state-federal collaboration following President Trump's proposed \$1 billion investment in Great Salt Lake restoration and protection.

Federal perspectives were

provided by representatives from the Bureau of Reclamation, Environmental Protection Agency, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Natural Resources Conservation Service. Rep. Celeste Maloy and Rep. Blake Moore also participated in the discussion, sharing perspectives from Congress on the future of Great Salt Lake conservation efforts and federal partnership opportunities.

The roundtable builds on growing federal engagement around the lake. Last week, Utah's Department of Environmental Quality and Department of Natural Resources hosted EPA Administrator Lee Zeldin, Sen. John Curtis and other federal leaders for a firsthand tour of the Great Salt Lake and surrounding restoration efforts.

"The Great Salt Lake is one of Utah's greatest treasures and one of our most important responsibilities," said Gov. Cox. "The progress we've made over the past several years shows what's possible when state leaders, local communities, researchers, conservation groups and federal partners work together. We have more work to do, but I'm encouraged by the momentum we're seeing and the growing commitment to the lake's future."

The executive order takes effect immediately.

administrative act."

The action also "fundamentally shifts governance" by transferring local control over zoning and land use to MIDA, the application reads.

"(The) county clerk will likely reject the application (citing MIDA statutes as administrative), but our attorneys believe there is a reasonable chance a judge will see this as referable. We may be able to appeal to the Utah Supreme Court directly or via extraordinary writ. Recent court trends seem favorable to citizen rights in these matters," sponsors wrote.

Referendum petitioners referred to a 2018 Utah Supreme Court decision establishing that "major land and development decisions are legislative acts subject to a public vote when they have long-term impact and involve weighing competing public interests," they said in a news release on Thursday.

"These Resolutions meet that same standard: they permanently reshape how a massive stretch of County land is governed, redirect significant tax revenue, and were openly debated by the Commission with acknowledged sweeping consequences for residents," the group wrote.

The county also said in the decision announcement that repealing the resolutions the commissioners approved "would result in the loss of guaranteed revenue, including \$5.4 million annually and an estimated \$108 million annually at full capacity." Additionally, if the development were to move forward without the resolutions, it would cost the county about \$5.4 million a year for services like fire, ambulance and police.

The tab for holding a special election for the referendum would be approximately \$55,000, said county auditor Shirlene Larsen.

Act, and it is irrevocable, the county explained. And, the decision on an interlocal cooperation agreement with the authority is also administrative "because it implements MIDA's existing project area plan and acts as a specific contract between the County and MIDA, rather than creating a new, generally applicable law."

Expect a legal challenge

However, the process isn't over. Applicants have the right to appeal the decision, and representatives from the newly established Box Elder Accountability Referendum group said they would pursue a legal challenge.

"We are not going away. This was our first plan, but it was not our last. We care deeply about this community

and will fight to protect it from those who seek to do it harm," Brenna Williams, co-sponsor of the referendum said in a statement on Thursday.

In their application, the group of citizens sponsoring the referendum initiative said commissioners had "exercised a discretionary choice by consenting to include private land in the MIDA project area and by approving the interlocal agreement. This was not a mandatory or 'perfunctory'

Colorado River faces system-wide crash

Warning comes as seven Western states and federal government struggle to agree on new rules for managing the shrinking river.

Boulder, Colo. » Colorado River experts and decision makers gathered in Boulder, Colorado, this week to discuss the future of the water supply for 40 million people across the Southwest. At the registration table, a new white paper set the tone for the conference at the Colorado Law School: "Colorado River Basin Storage Continues Slide Toward System Crash."

If the Colorado River Basin

has another dry year, even if water consumption is at or near historic lows, Lake Powell and Lake Mead will likely drop to levels that could threaten dam infrastructure and downstream deliveries to major southwest cities and agriculture hubs at the start of the 2028 water year, according to the paper co-authored by Colorado River experts.

If next year is more similar to a heavy snow year like 2023, then the nation's two largest reservoirs would recover to an extent, but that cushion would

likely only last for about two years, the paper says.

"We're going to have to work harder to save water than we have ever worked before in the 21st century," said Jack Schmidt, one of the paper's co-authors, in an interview before the conference.

The researchers intentionally didn't use the "most extreme" years in their study, Schmidt added. For the dry scenario, they used historic flow data from 2025, the fifth driest year in the 21st century. The wet scenario used 2023 flows, which were the

third highest in the past 26 years.

"We're trying to lay out, in the starkest terms, where we're at so that everybody understands the significance of the cuts that lie ahead," Schmidt said. "We cannot go over the cliff."

That "cliff" is dropping below "reasonably accessible storage," which the paper defines as the water above 3,500 feet at Lake Powell and 975 feet at Lake Mead. The Bureau of Reclamation has identified these as critical elevations to

protect hydropower production and infrastructure at the dams.

"Maintaining elevation of 3,500 feet is essential for protecting operational reliability," Scott Cameron, acting commissioner of Reclamation, said during a talk Thursday.

Critical elevations at Powell

The April water forecast showed Lake Powell could drop below 3,500 feet as soon as this summer, but with recent actions from Reclamation, including large releases from Flaming Gorge and reductions in flows out of Glen Canyon Dam, Lake Powell is now projected to drop below that level in early 2027.

Such "crisis-driven operations" were once rare, Katrina Grantz, Reclamation's deputy director for the Upper Colorado region, said during the conference. Now those are becoming "routine," she added.

Reclamation has no other tools to prop up Lake Powell by early next year, though, Cameron told The Tribune.

"In terms of things that we could do in the near term, like between December 2026 and March of 2027, there really aren't too many new and different things," he said. "We're basically stuck with using the same two levers that we use this year."

Reclamation may reduce flows out of Lake Powell below 6 million acre-feet, Cameron said. That's the lowest release allowed in current agreements, but the agency did outline smaller releases in its draft environmental review for post-2026 operations.

When The Tribune asked if the agency has authority to reduce releases further, Cameron said, "My initial non-lawyerly reaction is yes, but that doesn't mean we won't get sued."

If Lake Powell drops below where it can generate hydropower, Reclamation will no longer send water through the dam's penstocks and instead solely rely on the river outlet works lower down in the dam.

"We are confident that the river outlet works can be safely utilized below elevation 3,490," Grantz said. "However, some operational concerns have been raised, and, namely, those are the increased potential for cavitation and sediment scouring."

At lower water levels, air bubbles can enter the tubes, explode and erode the pipe coating, Grantz explained. That happened in 2023, she said.

Also, when just using the river outlet works, rocks and cobbles can build up where water would normally flow out of the penstocks, potentially causing issues for bringing power generation back online, she added.

Reclamation is currently studying these issues, as well as conducting an appraisal study of potential dam modifications.

'All kind of depressing'

The dire future outlined in the white paper was echoed during the first talk of the conference on Thursday.

Brad Udall, a senior climate and water scientist at Colorado State University, started his presentation with an image of Eeyore, a "Winnie The Pooh" character that he was called during last year's conference.

"Eeyore is just kind of a bummer to be around, right?" Udall said. "I mean, he's just permanently depressed for no good reason. I'm depressed, but I actually have good

reasons."

Udall shared what's making him grim, from a graph of this year's record early and low snowmelt to a map of March's off-the-charts temperatures.

"Every [Colorado River Basin] state had the warmest March on record, and simultaneously really dry," he said. "Interestingly, or disturbingly, we now have areas in the West where the March record high temperatures exceed the April record high temperatures."

Warming due to climate change will continue to cause persistent drought in the U.S.

Southwest, Udall said, citing various studies.

He then brought up what he called "the only chart that matters." It showed a stark upward trend in greenhouse gas emissions since 1850. Even if emissions were to go to zero tomorrow, temperatures will continue to stay high for hundreds to thousands of years, he said.

"All kind of depressing, right?" he added.

Despite his nickname, though, Udall called himself an optimist.

"We are going to get to redo, like it or not, 100 years of law and policy around how we manage a critical resource, and so we should not waste this opportunity," he said.

The state of negotiations

The seven U.S. states that share the Colorado River still haven't reached an agreement on how to manage the river system after current operating guidelines for dry times expire at the end of this year.

"As hydrology worsens, consensus is harder to come by," said Becky Mitchell, Colorado's negotiator, during a panel at the conference Friday morning.

Reclamation and the basin states have been in "continuous discussions to develop a consensus-based proposal," Cameron said. "We've tried to understand where the seven states are coming from. We have tried to figure out what compromise solutions might be."

That has included three proposals that Reclamation thought all states would like. "Turns out we were wrong," he said.

Lower Basin states — Arizona, California and Nevada — released a proposal on May 1 that provides a pathway forward through 2028, including 3.2 million acre-feet of water savings in the Lower Basin.

"There's a reasonable, rational operating plan for the next two plus years right in front of our face, and we should take that," John Entsminger, Nevada's negotiator, said during a panel discussion on Friday.

Reclamation must have new operating guidelines in place for Powell by October 1, though. The agency plans to release a final environmental impact statement in mid-summer with its preferred path for operating the river system for the next 10 years, Cameron said.

"If peace breaks out and we have a seven-state agreement on something a year and a half from now, or four and a half years from now," he added, "we're happy to take that agreement and have it supplant this 10-year framework."

Sen. Lee wants consequences for states suing over Colorado River

Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee held a hearing on the Colorado River as states continue to struggle to reach deal.

States that choose to sue a fellow Colorado River Basin state “should not expect Congress to reward that decision with additional federal funding,” Utah Sen. Mike Lee warned during a Senate committee hearing this week.

“Taxpayers should not be asked to subsidize litigation

among states,” he added.

The Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee held a hearing on Wednesday to conduct oversight on the Colorado River Basin and the ongoing negotiations over future operations of the river system. Senators discussed requests for billions of dollars to help the region shore up water supplies, but Utah representatives

don’t think any funding should go to states that sue over the river.

“Utah asks that you fund solutions, not lawsuits,” Amy Haas, executive director of the Colorado River Authority of Utah, said during her testimony. “Some states in this basin are preparing to sue their sister states. Some have made a public display

over hiring high-dollar law firms. Litigation funds are being set aside.”

Utah is among those states that have set aside money for litigation. The Legislature budgeted roughly \$6 million for a potential Colorado River lawsuit in the 2026 legislative session.

Arizona has hired a “high-powered law firm” and also allocated millions of dollars to a Colorado River legal defense fund, according to the Arizona Mirror. Colorado is also preparing for litigation.

“We urge Congress to send a clear signal: states that choose courtrooms over cooperation should not expect Washington to bankroll it,” Haas added. “States that sue other states should not be rewarded.”

Negotiations among Utah and the six other states that share the river have been at a standstill. The Interior Department is conducting its environmental review process and must release a decision on how to operate the reservoirs it manages, including Lake Powell and Lake Mead, before the next water year begins on Oct. 1. The department hoped to use a seven-state deal as a guide for its plans, but no consensus has surfaced.

Senators and governors from Utah and Wyoming met in Washington ahead of the committee hearing to affirm their commitment to a consensus deal on the river.

“Utah remains committed to a seven-basin-state solution that protects the long-term future of the Colorado River,” said Gov. Spencer Cox in a statement. “Any durable agreement must recognize the realities facing the Upper Basin, where communities are already living with significant shortages and doing their part to conserve water. We believe the best path forward is a fair, negotiated solution that keeps all states at the table and avoids years of costly litigation.”

Meanwhile, the various reservoirs along the Colorado River are at about 34% of the total system capacity, according to a June 7 report from the Bureau of Reclamation. Lake Powell is only 25% full and Lead Mead is 29% full.

“The window to solve this without lawyers, judges, and generational damage to basin relationships is shrinking faster than Lake Powell,” Haas said.

The Bureau of Reclamation is releasing an unprecedented amount of water out of Flaming Gorge and reducing flows out of Lake Powell to protect infrastructure at Glen Canyon Dam this year.

“Everyone agrees that a seven-state consensus agreement is the preferred outcome, yet I’m concerned that Interior has spent a great deal of time focused on short-term operations,” Sen. Martin Heinrich, D-N.M., said. “The department has yet to articulate a clear strategy for moving the basin towards a long-term agreement that everyone says they want.”

“Without a seven-state agreement,”

he added, “the consequences are clear: more litigation, unplanned water shortages, economic disruption and heightened risk to communities least able to absorb it.”

If litigation happens, it will be “unprecedented, will involve all seven basin states, and will be orders of magnitude larger than any interstate water case ever brought,” Haas said. “It will potentially take multiple decades to resolve.”

“Utah is calling for a legal detente now,” she added, “before the first briefs are filed, before positions harden that make compromise impossible.”

What’s on the table

The Interior Department plans to release a 10-year operating framework for the Colorado River this summer, said Andrea Travnick, assistant secretary of water and science for the department.

Within that broader framework, the department would release operational guidelines every two years. “The goal is to produce an alternative that bounds for certainty and stability, with the flexibility to adjust to evolving hydrologic conditions in the absence of consensus,” Travnick said.

The plan will likely include details on shortage guidelines in the Lower Basin, coordinated reservoir operations and programs for saving and storing water in the reservoirs. It may involve elements that have been proposed by both Upper and Lower Basin states, Travnick added.

Haas said that Utah will continue to support future releases from Flaming Gorge under three conditions: releases are capped, the reservoir is successfully recovered and the water released is used to protect elevations at Lake Powell, not provide extra water for downstream releases.

Travnick said that recovery at Flaming Gorge and the other upper reservoirs in the Colorado River system is “extremely important.”

“We want to make sure that we’re not just continuing to use those and bring them down to the mud,” she added.

Beyond Flaming Gorge, Haas said that Utah and other Upper Basin states have committed to conserving 100,000 acre-feet in 2027 and 2028, with Utah specifically contributing 23,000 acre-feet.

Lower Basin states released a proposal in May that included a conservation commitment of 3.2 million acre-feet of water through 2028. Those states have asked the Upper Basin to put verifiable water contributions on the table as part of a seven-state deal.

“I’m grateful to these states for their leadership and hope to see that plan adopted,” Arizona Senator Ruben Gallego said.

Colorado River states have also submitted funding “wish lists” to the department that add up to around \$50 billion, Lee said.

That list is in the early stages, though, said Travnick, who noted that the seven basin states have received \$9 billion in federal funds over the past five years.

More than 70 organizations, ranging from Trout Unlimited to the Kaibab Band of Paiutes, sent a letter to Congress asking for at least \$2 billion in new federal funding for near-term drought mitigation measures, alongside a long-term federal funding mechanism for the Colorado River region.

That \$2 billion could help lessen some of the “anxiety, uncertainty and stress” people are feeling across the watershed, which supports 40 million people, said Tom Kiernan, CEO of American Rivers, one of the organizations that signed on to the letter.

“The Colorado River Basin cannot transition to a resilient, secure future without significant additional federal investment,” he said. “Funding is not a temporary solution. It is a bridge to a long-term, durable solution.”

READY TO POLISH

CUWCD opens groundwater cleaning plant in Vineyard

Last week, the Central Utah Water Conservancy District announced the completion of a project that will improve drinking water quality in the northern Utah County community.

The Groundwater Polishing Plant was built in the CUWCD's Vineyard Complex and will polish water gathered from wells before it is

distributed to homes in Vineyard, Saratoga Springs, Eagle Mountain, Lehi and southern Salt Lake County.

"The completion of this facility reflects our commitment to providing high-quality drinking water for the communities we serve today and into the future," CUWCD General Manager Gene Shawcroft said in a news release. "As our region grows, investments like this

help us maximize local water resources while maintaining the high standards our customers expect."

According to the CUWCD, groundwater is drawn from wells that go more than 1,500 feet deep. This groundwater already met state and federal drinking standards, but the new facility will remove naturally occurring iron and manganese from this water to improve its quality and appearance. CUWCD spokesman

Zackary Seipert told the Daily Herald the project cost \$100 million and was funded by the users that buy the water.

“Groundwater is a critical part of our water supply portfolio,” CUWCD Project Manager Shaun Hilton said. “This facility gives us greater flexibility in how we manage those supplies while delivering even higher-quality water to our customers.”

Construction started in 2023 and involved inserting pressure vessels, backwash systems and additional in-

frastructure, according to the news release.

The project is part of the CUWCD Water Development Project, or CWP. In 2005, the water agency bought Geneva Steel’s water rights to accommodate water needs for growing communities in Utah and Salt Lake counties.

Since 2007, CUWCD said it has built eight wells on the old Geneva Steel land and more than 23 miles of pipelines. The CWP, which also distributes water from the Don A. Christiansen Treatment Plant Orem, has a 53,300-acre-foot annual water supply. Much of that water goes to Eagle Mountain, Saratoga Springs, Lehi and Vineyard.

A plan to keep northern Utah lawns green could drastically cut flows in a river that feeds the Great Salt Lake

Logan » Clay Essig has lived on the bank of the Little Logan River for years. It was where his parents built his childhood home in the late '60s, and where he returned when he bought the place about a decade ago.

The cool mountain creek splits from its more forceful counterpart, the Logan River, just upstream, then flows between River Hollow Park and his house.

"All along here, people find places to come and play, but it's just such a beautiful, peaceful river," he said.

Throughout his life, he has seen the stream shrink. Now, as a project seeks to

redirect much of the river's flow to keep Cache Valley lawns green, Essig worries it may be slowed to a trickle.

The Cache Water District and Crockett Avenue Irrigation Co. — a conglomeration of several canal companies — want to install a pressurized system that would take the Little Logan River's place in getting water for irrigation to people in Hyde Park, North Logan and Logan. The cities are cosponsoring the effort.

The new system would divert water from First Dam near the mouth of Logan Canyon, rather than allowing it to flow through the small waterway, where the three cities currently tap in for untreated irrigation water, often called secondary water.

River runs through changes

Project backers say the current system just isn't efficient enough in getting water to the municipalities.

"There's a lot of people in the cities — a lot of residents in the cities — who would like to be able to use secondary water, but we can't deliver it to them," said Gordon Coulson, the president of the irrigation company. "Everything right now is still all gravity flow under no pressure."

To help secure funding from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service, officials also want to construct trails along Canyon Road and over the river, according to project manager Zan Murray, who works for J.U.B. Engineers, a group contracted for the initiative.

In its entirety, the plan would cost almost \$210 million, with about 90% of that being funded through the USDA, according to Murray.

The sponsor cities and irrigation company would be responsible for the portion not covered by federal funding.

If it is built, the cities could require people to connect to secondary water where it's available, or they could adjust culinary prices to promote the use of untreated water.

Lyndsay Peterson, the mayor of North Logan, said Thursday that staff in the city "have been resolute that only the residents who receive secondary water in North Logan" would pay for the project.

Slowing the flow

Rerouting water before it hits the Little Logan River means the waterway could get even littler.

Currently, state data shows, the river is flowing at 70 cubic feet per second where it crosses Riverside Drive.

A draft environmental study says the project would leave a baseline flow of five to 10 cubic feet per second in the river, Murray, however, concedes that will only happen when there is enough water to go around.

While the prospect of reduced flows have stoked fears about the future of recreation on the waterway and downstream effects on the ailing Great Salt Lake, proponents of the plan say it packs plenty of positives.

For one thing, Logan Public Works Department director Paul Lindhardt said, it will remove 28 homes near the Logan River from a flood plain.

Cities will also see a smaller demand for culinary water than they otherwise would as they continue to grow, he said.

If the project is built, water rates are estimated to go up in the near term, project officials say, though they believe the reduced culinary water demand will mean smaller prices in the long run.

Lindhardt said a new pressurized system would allow the city to delay or eliminate other costly water projects.

On top of that, a new system would mean less water would be lost to seepage because it would travel through a pipe, according to the plan's draft environmental study.

Coulson, the Crockett Avenue Irrigation Co. president, said the plan also would help his company retain its water rights. If someone legally challenged the company, and the organization couldn't show its rights are being used beneficially, it could lose water rights, he said.

Gardens and grass or the Great Salt Lake

Many who spoke out at a public meeting on the effort last month were not convinced the project is worth it.

If the new system is needed for the irrigation company to retain its water rights, some argued, then maybe the company doesn't actually need those water rights. That water,

they said, would be better used flowing downstream into the Bear River, the thirty-third Salt Lake's largest tributary.

Susanne Janeecke — a retired geosciences professor at Utah State University and longtime advocate of the Little Logan River — said the project sends the wrong message in the midst of the lake's ongoing water crisis.

"People would be encouraged to use river water to irrigate their landscapes, which is mostly lawns in Utah," she said. "It seems really wrong to be encouraging the use of more river water on personal landscapes rather than conservation."

Patrick Belmont, a watershed sciences professor at USU, said extra water from the Logan River could instead be "a big part of the solution" to the lake's dipping levels.

"This is a really proximate source," Belmont said. "These plans to just utilize as much as we can right here — especially for turf grass — that's a values judgement, but I don't think we're making that values judgement in a very coherent way as a community right now."

Giving water users a choice

Coulson said his company plans to discuss potentially leasing water to the Great Salt Lake this fall.

"It hasn't been communicated well," he said of the state's leasing program. "The canal companies don't know what the state is offering, partially because of the different phases that it's gone through to get to this point, and not everybody knows and not everybody qualifies."

Even if leasing water to the Great Salt Lake could help the irrigation company retain its water rights without a major infrastructure overhaul, Coulson said he still sees the Little Logan River diversion project as necessary. People, he said, should have a choice in what water they use on their lawns, and this project would make secondary water a more widely available alternative.

"They will have the option to use it or not," he said. "OK, that's part of the great thing about living in America, is we do have choice."

Project plans are expected to be finalized this fall, according to USDA documents. If it moves forward, construction would be slated to begin in 2028 and end in 2033.

Washington County water managers are boosting the cash incentive for residents to ditch grass

Trading turf for desert landscaping just got a bit more lucrative. Water managers in Washington County are bumping their grass-removal rebate to push hesitant homeowners off the fence and into water-wise landscaping.

After several years of paying \$2 per square foot to help residents rip out thirsty grass, the Washington County Water Conservancy District has increased the incentive to \$3 per square foot on the first 1,000 square feet of lawn removed. That covers most residential yards.

"We'd been at \$2 for three seasons," said Doug Bennett, the district's water conservation manager. "My research suggests that costs have gone up between 15 and 25%. Our rebate was actually seeming to shrink, so we wanted to make sure we gave a boost during drought conditions and encourage people to finish projects swiftly rather than sit on them."

The extra dollar not only aims to save water, Bennett added, but also to buck the trend of local landscaping businesses experiencing their slowest season during St. George's hot summers.

"It's a good opportunity to give a boost to the local economy... at a time when it is most critical for us to conserve water," he said. "The \$3 rebate should give people on the fence a bit of a push to move in the right direction."

'Do this now'

Since the launch of the program in December 2022, Washington County residents have completed nearly 3,000 projects and removed nearly 4 million square feet of grass, according to district officials.

"You could push a lawn mower from here to Santa Barbara, California, across the amount of grass that the citizens of Washington County have replaced with desert-appropriate plants," Bennett said.

The district expects the enhanced rebate to cost about \$500,000 more than the previous program — though half will eventually be reimbursed by the state as part of the Water Efficient Landscape Program.

"We have to budget for the full cost of the program, and then we get reimbursed by the state," Bennett said. "In terms of actual expense, we're looking at about \$250,000."

The higher payout comes with a deadline. The district's board has only authorized the extra dollar

for projects completed by June 1 of next year. After that, unless the board takes new action, the rebate snaps back to \$2. "So we're encouraging people to do this now," Bennett said.

This grass-reduction initiative is saving roughly 500 acre-feet — nearly 200 million gallons — of water annually, he said. Early data shows participating homeowners are cutting their usage by 80,000 to 100,000 gallons per year, in some cases slashing their previous water demand by nearly half.

Change of heart

When turf removal was first introduced, residents of Sun Country Meadows South — a 55-plus community in St. George — met the proposal with deep skepticism, according to resident Chris Green.

"Many residents simply could not picture a beautiful community without traditional grass," said Green, who serves on the landscaping committee for the 17-acre property of 119 townhouses.

Now, she added, attitudes have changed. Residents have converted more than 20,500 square feet of grass adjacent to their homes into more drought-tolerant landscaping. In addition, the homeowners association has transformed 17,500 square feet of turf, previously unusable because it was in decorative patches around the clubhouse and pond.

"In its place, we now have

beautiful walking paths and seating areas where everyone can now enjoy the pond and local wildlife," Green said.

"Treebates' for shade trees

For Zach Renstrom, the district's general manager, conservation is smart economics.

"When we conserve an acre-foot of water, it's the cheapest water we can get," he said. "We are not giving up anything. We are actually replacing it with something that's very beautiful, very green, and makes our community a better place."

Renstrom calls the program "a continuation" of Washington County's long-running effort to stretch a limited resource. "We've always looked at how to be good stewards of our water," he said.

Alongside the fatter turf rebate, the district is paying people to plant shade trees to fight urban heat islands. Participants in the budding "Treebate Program" can now get \$100 per tree, with one tree allowed for every 700 square feet of project area. Approved species include desert-adapted or low to moderate-water trees such as desert willow, oaks and Mondale pine that can reach at least 15 feet tall.

On an extremely hot summer day, sitting beneath the shade of a tree makes a huge difference.

"When you have shade," Bennett said, "those surfaces underneath [trees] can be 50 degrees Fahrenheit cooler than they would be if they were exposed to the sun."

Tensions rise among states that rely on the Colorado River

A prolonged drought means the nation's largest reservoirs are dwindling, and litigation over access to water could lie ahead.

Boulder, Colorado » Water in the Colorado River is dwindling to levels that haven't been seen in decades, and the seven states whose residents and farmers depend on the river can't agree on a fair way to divide up what's left.

Negotiations are going nowhere despite more than six months of ongoing talks, plus cajoling by the Trump administration, which twice gathered governors in hopes of a breakthrough that never came. States are already sniping at aspects of a water-use plan the federal Bureau of Reclamation is set to unveil this summer and impose later this year, and they're threatening to sue each other over water deliveries, raising the prospects of prolonged legal battles just as Western states face demands to sharply reduce water use.

The river's system of reservoirs and canals was designed for the climate and population of a century ago. It has strained to adapt to a declining water supply and enormous growth in communities in the river basin, despite improvements in efficiency that mean even booming cities are using less water than in the past. Water rights that may date back to the arrival of European settlers also complicate matters. And a year of extreme drought is making it even harder to decide how much each state can draw from the Colorado.

It is not for lack of effort.

"We have invested time, effort and money in trying to facilitate a

multistate agreement," Scott Cameron, the acting commissioner of the Bureau of Reclamation, said in an interview this month, moments after signing a deal that could one day augment the basin's supply using desalinated water from a plant in Carlsbad, California.

But a day later, Cameron told a conference of water experts in Boulder, Colorado, that states have repeatedly rejected proposals for compromise. He said he doesn't expect any state to be pleased with the measures the federal government is expected to take to delay or prevent reservoirs from dropping to critical lows in the short term.

"I think we've succeeded in making everyone unhappy, and maybe making everyone mad," he said.

About 40 million people and 5.5 million acres of cropland depend on the Colorado for drinking water and irrigation, but its flow has gradually diminished over the past two decades as the climate becomes warmer and more arid across the West. Now the arcane system of water rights governing the river entitles each state and Mexico to far more water than is actually available. The rules prioritize the longest-established uses of water, in many cases dating to the 1850s and 1860s.

But the states have been unable to agree upon water cuts that would reflect the new reality.

In the river's lower basin — which includes growing urban areas in California, Arizona and Nevada, vast agricultural operations and the nation's largest reservoir, Lake Mead — communities have agreed to significant reductions in recent years. A new proposal that the states are asking the federal government to consider would curtail use even more, but the lower basin states and tribal nations have asked

upstream communities in New Mexico, Utah, Colorado and Wyoming to cut back, too.

But any time winter snowpack in the river's headwaters is meager, the upper basin is forced to use less water, so those states have resisted committing to permanent annual water use cuts. While a 1922 compact divides the United States' share of the river's flow equally between the two basins, the less-populated upper basin consumes significantly less water each year than the lower basin.

The stalemate between the basins has deepened as the stakes rise. An existing water-use plan expired this winter, and the states missed key deadlines to agree on a new one, which must be in place by October to avoid chaos and confusion in water deliveries.

A mild winter and extreme spring heat left winter snowpack so depleted that Lake Powell, the nation's second-largest reservoir, which straddles the upper and lower basins, risked falling below levels critical for hydropower until federal officials began emergency actions to shift water around and keep dams generating electricity.

So far, Trump administration officials have resisted imposing any plan unilaterally, though Cameron said the bureau had "not been passive." It has offered \$454 million for water

conservation projects across the basin, using money left over from the Inflation Reduction Act, which was passed under President Joe Biden and included \$4 billion for drought response in the West. Cameron said less than \$100 million is left to help pay for more water savings.

"We have floated, three times, solutions that we thought represented something that the seven states could agree on," Cameron said. "Turns out we were wrong."

With the states unable to agree, the federal government is set to put new guidelines in place. Cameron said he expects Interior Secretary Doug Burgum, whose department includes the Reclamation Bureau, to release a plan in July to govern use of the river for the next decade. Before that plan becomes final, it would need approval from a White House that has so far not gotten very involved in Western water issues.

A draft plan released in January included a range of options, some of which would make significant cuts across the lower basin, where the federal government's control of reservoirs gives it more power to cut off flows. The alternatives would force water shortages, mostly in the lower basin, based upon reservoir conditions. They include varying levels of cutbacks that would leave some risks of unplanned

emergency water shortages in the lower basin.

Arizona is especially vulnerable because of its heavy reliance on the reservoirs and its relatively junior water rights. The federal plan would include room for tweaks and negotiations every two years, Cameron said. But state officials from across the region said that could make things worse.

The biggest problem is that reopening the whole plan every two years would undermine any certainty over water supplies, which is a key goal of the talks, said Becky Mitchell, Colorado's top water negotiator.

"The constant renegotiation every two years is difficult to fathom," Mitchell said, adding she believed it could create even more tension between the states. John Entsminger, Nevada's negotiator, agreed it was "not a good plan."

But Cameron said it was the best option given how difficult it has been to craft a longer-term deal.

As the talks stall, the threat of litigation is looming larger, even though negotiators have said they are hoping to avoid court battles that would undoubtedly be lengthy, expensive and unpredictable. Sen. Mike Lee, R-Utah, warned that he would seek to block federal drought relief funds from any states that sue over Colorado River water.

In Arizona and Colorado, officials have been readying lawyers and setting aside public funds for a legal fight. Earlier this year, television ads paid for by a coalition of Arizona water users warned that the state is "being targeted" with crippling cuts. Officials in both states said litigation was a real possibility.

In public comments submitted in response to the federal proposal, the states have hinted at contradictory legal interpretations of the 1922 compact, offering dueling arguments that both suggest that the Trump administration was at risk of violating that document. In dispute is whether the compact requires upper basin states to deliver a set amount of water downstream, regardless of conditions, or if the compact simply bars those upstream states from using more than they are officially allotted.

Utah officials warn of 'totally unprecedented' Colorado River water shortages as towns run dry

Utah and other Colorado River states confront record low water supply as negotiations over the river remain at a standstill.

Utah's top official overseeing the Colorado River gave a serious warning alongside his counterparts from other states Tuesday: Utah's farmers and ranchers, as well as some rural towns, are grappling with drastic water shortages from the ongoing drought.

"I want you all to recognize the significance and severity of the things we're dealing with — totally unprecedented," said Gene Shawcroft,

Utah's Colorado River commissioner, during Tuesday's meeting of the Upper Colorado River Commission. "The real question is, what happens if next year looks like this? And I hope we don't have to answer that question."

Utah's state engineer has already cut back "some of the most senior rights in Utah on the Colorado River system," Shawcroft said. Those include water rights that date back to 1886 on Ashley Creek and 1906 on the Duchesne River, both tributaries to the Green River in eastern Utah.

Shawcroft cited other problems Utah has faced this year:

» A small mountain reservoir, one the state typically doesn't release water from until early

July, will be empty by June 29 — Monday.

» Streams that typically run at 1,200 cubic feet per second during spring run off peaked at 257 cubic feet per second this year.

» No water deliveries were made this irrigation season on the Price River system.

» The town of Emery will be out of water this week and hauling water.

» The town of Apple Valley, in Washington County, saw a main well go dry, and will be under emergency circumstances as it runs out of drinking water.

While streams and wells run low or dry across the state, Lake Powell and other major Colorado River reservoirs are also dropping towards record low levels. Meanwhile, states still can't agree on how to share the river during dry years after current interim guidelines expire this year.

The Bureau of Reclamation's latest forecast for the major Colorado River reservoirs was the "elephant in the room" during Tuesday's commission meeting, said Becky Mitchell, Colorado's commissioner.

"That shows the very dire, dire outcomes for Lake Powell and the upstream initial units, including Flaming Gorge, Blue Mesa and Navajo," she added.

Reclamation's "most probable" forecast shows Powell dropping two feet below minimum power pool by the end of March 2027. At that level, Reclamation can no longer generate hydropower at Glen Canyon Dam, and must use bypass tubes that were not intended for long-term water releases.

Status of negotiations

As the hydrology gets worse, it is more difficult for states to reach a solution for how to manage the waterway, Mitchell said.

The stakes are high: The Colorado River and its tributaries support 40 million people across the U.S. Southwest and northern Mexico, including multi-billion dollar agricultural economies, major cities from Salt Lake City to Phoenix and 30 federally recognized tribes.

As negotiations drag on and the federal government prepares to release its own plan next month, New Mexico's Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham has replaced her state's lead negotiator, Estevan López, with Tanya Trujillo, the state's deputy water engineer and a former

U.S. Department of Interior official.

"We're in a crisis," Trujillo said, "and I have been appointed by our governor based on her interest and involvement in Colorado River issues and her discouragement at the fact that we have not been able to make more progress."

"We can't put the blame on one person's actions or inactions," she added, "but the situation in the basin is not OK."

The federal government must have a new operating plan in place for the region's reservoirs by Oct. 1, the start of the new water year. The Bureau of Reclamation plans to release a final environmental impact statement that will outline its preferred management alternative in July. It will release a final decision in August, said Wayne Pullan, Reclamation's regional director for the Upper Colorado River Basin.

Those documents will be "largely procedural," he added. The agency will lay out operating plans for

the river system for 2027 and 2028, with hopes that the states will agree on those plans. Reclamation, in coordination with the states, will then develop new operating plans every two years through 2037.

One sticking point between the Upper Basin states and Lower Basin states is how to treat the reservoirs upstream of Powell, including Flaming Gorge.

The bureau is planning to release up to 1 million acre-feet of water from Flaming Gorge through spring of 2027 to prop up Lake Powell.

The basin should consider such releases a one-year stopgap, not a regular event, Shawcroft said.

"We certainly have sufficient reservoirs that are empty," he added. "We don't need additional empty reservoirs."

Summary: JVVCD's retail distribution system in Millcreek and South Salt Lake includes numerous cast iron pipelines installed in the 1950s and 1960s that are in need of replacement due to age and deterioration. These pipelines are experiencing an increasing frequency of waterline breaks requiring ongoing repairs. This project will replace approximately 8,800 feet of cast iron pipe with new PVC pipeline and includes the installation of new fire hydrants, valves, meter setters and boxes, as well as roadway restoration in areas impacted by construction.
